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1 **INTRODUCTION**

2  
3 The following Special Provisions are made a part of this contract and supersede any conflicting  
4 provisions of the 2020 Standard Specifications for Road, Bridge, and Municipal Construction, and the  
5 foregoing Amendments to the Standard Specifications.

6  
7 The said Standard Specifications and Amendments thereto, the WSDOT Standard Plans, and WSDOT  
8 Construction Manual, together with the Special Provisions and the attached plans hereinafter contained,  
9 covering all work specified under this contract are incorporated and hereby made a part of this contract.  
10 The Special Provisions hereinafter contained shall supersede any conflicting provisions of the Standard  
11 Specifications and Amendments thereto, the WSDOT Standard Plans, and WSDOT Construction Manual.

12  
13 Several types of Special Provisions are included in this contract; General, Region, Bridges and  
14 Structures, and Project Specific. Special Provisions types are differentiated as follows:

- 15 (date) General Special Provision
- 16 (\*\*\*\*\*) Notes a revision to a General Special Provision
- 17 and also notes a Project Specific Special Provision.
- 18 (APWA GSP) American Public Works Association General Special Provision

19  
20  
21 **General Special Provisions** are similar to Standard Specifications in that they typically apply to many  
22 projects, usually in more than one Region. Usually, the only difference from one project to another is  
23 the inclusion of variable project data, inserted as a “fill-in”.

24  
25 **Project Specific Special Provisions** normally appear only in the contract for which they were  
26 developed.

27  
28 The following paragraph pertaining to the Standard Specifications shall obtain and be made a part of  
29 this contract:

30  
31 Wherever the word “State” or “Contracting Agency” is used it shall mean Lewis County; that  
32 wherever the words “Secretary (Secretary of Transportation)” are used they shall mean Lewis  
33 County Engineer; that wherever the words “State Treasurer” are used they shall mean Lewis  
34 County Treasurer; that wherever the words “State Auditor” are used they shall mean Lewis  
35 County Auditor; that wherever the words “Motor Vehicle Fund” are used they shall mean Lewis  
36 County Road Fund.

39 **DIVISION 1**  
40 **GENERAL REQUIREMENTS**

41  
42 **1-01, DESCRIPTION OF WORK**

43 (March 13, 1995)

44  
45 This contract provides for the improvement of \*\*\* approximately 60.47 miles of roadway, in Lewis  
46 County by placing Flexible Guide Posts as directed by the Engineer, traffic control on various roads \*\*\*  
47 and other work, all in accordance with the attached Plans, these Contract Provisions, and the Standard  
48 Specifications.

1 **1-01.3 Definitions**

2 (January 4, 2016 APWA GSP)

3  
4 Delete the heading **Completion Dates** and the three paragraphs that follow it, and replace them with  
5 the following:

6  
7 **Dates**

8 ***Bid Opening Date***

9 The date on which the Contracting Agency publicly opens and reads the Bids.

10 ***Award Date***

11 The date of the formal decision of the Contracting Agency to accept the lowest responsible and  
12 responsive Bidder for the Work.

13 ***Contract Execution Date***

14 The date the Contracting Agency officially binds the Agency to the Contract.

15 ***Notice to Proceed Date***

16 The date stated in the Notice to Proceed on which the Contract time begins.

17 ***Substantial Completion Date***

18 The day the Engineer determines the Contracting Agency has full and unrestricted use and  
19 benefit of the facilities, both from the operational and safety standpoint, any remaining traffic  
20 disruptions will be rare and brief, and only minor incidental work, replacement of temporary  
21 substitute facilities, plant establishment periods, or correction or repair remains for the Physical  
22 Completion of the total Contract.

23 ***Physical Completion Date***

24 The day all of the Work is physically completed on the project. All documentation required by  
25 the Contract and required by law does not necessarily need to be furnished by the Contractor by  
26 this date.

27 ***Completion Date***

28 The day all the Work specified in the Contract is completed and all the obligations of the  
29 Contractor under the contract are fulfilled by the Contractor. All documentation required by the  
30 Contract and required by law must be furnished by the Contractor before establishment of this  
31 date.

32 ***Final Acceptance Date***

33 The date on which the Contracting Agency accepts the Work as complete.

34  
35 Supplement this Section with the following:

36  
37 All references in the Standard Specifications, Amendments, or WSDOT General Special Provisions,  
38 to the terms "Department of Transportation", "Washington State Transportation Commission",  
39 "Commission", "Secretary of Transportation", "Secretary", "Headquarters", and "State Treasurer"  
40 shall be revised to read "Contracting Agency".

41  
42 All references to the terms "State" or "state" shall be revised to read "Contracting Agency" unless  
43 the reference is to an administrative agency of the State of Washington, a State statute or  
44 regulation, or the context reasonably indicates otherwise.

45  
46 All references to "State Materials Laboratory" shall be revised to read "Contracting Agency  
47 designated location".

48  
49 All references to "final contract voucher certification" shall be interpreted to mean the Contracting  
50 Agency form(s) by which final payment is authorized, and final completion and acceptance granted.  
51



1 **Additive**

2 A supplemental unit of work or group of bid items, identified separately in the Bid Proposal, which  
3 may, at the discretion of the Contracting Agency, be awarded in addition to the base bid.  
4

5 **Alternate**

6 One of two or more units of work or groups of bid items, identified separately in the Bid Proposal,  
7 from which the Contracting Agency may make a choice between different methods or material of  
8 construction for performing the same work.  
9

10 **Business Day**

11 A business day is any day from Monday through Friday except holidays as listed in Section 1-08.5.  
12

13 **Contract Bond**

14 The definition in the Standard Specifications for "Contract Bond" applies to whatever bond form(s)  
15 are required by the Contract Documents, which may be a combination of a Payment Bond and a  
16 Performance Bond.  
17

18 **Contract Documents**

19 See definition for "Contract".  
20

21 **Contract Time**

22 The period of time established by the terms and conditions of the Contract within which the Work  
23 must be physically completed.  
24

25 **Notice of Award**

26 The written notice from the Contracting Agency to the successful Bidder signifying the Contracting  
27 Agency's acceptance of the Bid Proposal.  
28

29 **Notice to Proceed**

30 The written notice from the Contracting Agency or Engineer to the Contractor authorizing and  
31 directing the Contractor to proceed with the Work and establishing the date on which the Contract  
32 time begins.  
33

34 **Traffic**

35 Both vehicular and non-vehicular traffic, such as pedestrians, bicyclists, wheelchairs, and equestrian  
36 traffic.  
37

38 **1-02, BID PROCEDURES AND CONDITIONS**

39 **1-02.1 Prequalification of Bidders**

40  
41 Delete this Section and replace it with the following:

43 **1-02.1 Qualifications of Bidder**

47 Before award of a public works contract, a bidder must meet at least the minimum qualifications of  
48 RCW 39.04.350(1) to be considered a responsible bidder and qualified to be awarded a public  
49 works project.

19 The Bidder shall submit with the Bid a completed Underutilized Disadvantaged Business Enterprise  
20 (UDBE) Utilization Certification, when required by the Special Provisions. For each and every UDBE  
21 firm listed on the Bidder's completed Underutilized Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Utilization  
22 Certification, the Bidder shall submit written confirmation from that UDBE firm that the UDBE is in  
23 agreement with the UDBE participation commitment that the Bidder has made in the Bidder's

26 WSDOT Form 422 031U (Underutilized Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Written Confirmation

21 All other information required to be submitted with the Bid Proposal must be submitted with the Bid  
22 Proposal itself, at the time stated in the Call for Bids.

23  
24 Proposals that are received as required will be publicly opened and read as specified in Section 1-  
25 02.12. The Contracting Agency will not open or consider any Bid Proposal that is received after the  
26 time specified in the Call for Bids for receipt of Bid Proposals, or received in a location other than that  
27 specified in the Call for Bids. The Contracting Agency will not open or consider any "Supplemental  
28 Information" (UDBE confirmations or GFE documentation) that is received after the time specified  
29 above, or received in a location other than that specified in the Call for Bids.

30  
31 If an emergency or unanticipated event interrupts normal work processes of the Contracting Agency  
32 so that Proposals cannot be received at the office designated for receipt of bids as specified in Section  
33 1-02.12 the time specified for receipt of the Proposal will be deemed to be extended to the same time  
34 of day specified in the solicitation on the first work day on which the normal work processes of the  
35 Contracting Agency resume.

- 12 a. The Bidder is not prequalified when so required;
  - 13 b. The authorized Proposal form furnished by the Contracting Agency is not used or is  
14 altered;
  - 15 c. The completed Proposal form contains any unauthorized additions, deletions, alternate  
16 Bids, or conditions;
  - 17 d. The Bidder adds provisions reserving the right to reject or accept the award, or enter into  
18 the Contract;
  - 19 e. A price per unit cannot be determined from the Bid Proposal;
  - 20 f. The Proposal form is not properly executed;
  - 21 g. The Bidder fails to submit or properly complete a Subcontractor list, if applicable, as  
22 required in Section 1-02.6;
  - 23 h. The Bidder fails to submit or properly complete an Underutilized Disadvantaged  
24 Business Enterprise Certification, if applicable, as required in Section 1-02.6;
  - 25 i. The Bidder fails to submit written confirmation from each UDBE firm listed on the  
26 Bidder’s completed UDBE Utilization Certification that they are in agreement with the  
27 bidder’s UDBE participation commitment, if applicable, as required in Section 1-02.6, or  
28 if the written confirmation that is submitted fails to meet the requirements of the Special  
29 Provisions;
  - 30 j. The Bidder fails to submit UDBE Good Faith Effort documentation, if applicable, as  
31 required in Section 1-02.6, or if the documentation that is submitted fails to demonstrate  
32 that a Good Faith Effort to meet the Condition of Award was made;
  - 33 k. The Bidder fails to submit a UDBE Bid Item Breakdown form, if applicable, as required in  
34 Section 1-02.6, or if the documentation that is submitted fails to meet the requirements

  - 46 b. Any of the unit prices are excessively unbalanced (either above or below the amount of  
47 a reasonable Bid) to the potential detriment of the Contracting Agency;
  - 48 c. Receipt of Addenda is not acknowledged;
  - 49 d. A member of a joint venture or partnership and the joint venture or partnership submit  
50 Proposals for the same project (in such an instance, both Bids may be rejected); or
  - 51 e. If Proposal form entries are not made in ink.

1 (May 17, 2018 APWA GSP, Option B)

2  
3 Delete this section and replace it with the following:

4  
5 A Bidder will be deemed not responsible if the Bidder does not meet the mandatory bidder  
6 responsibility criteria in RCW 39.04.350(1), as amended; or does not meet Supplemental Criteria  
7 1-7 listed in this Section.

8  
9 The Contracting Agency will verify that the Bidder meets the mandatory bidder responsibility  
10 criteria in RCW 39.04.350(1), and Supplemental Criteria 1-2. Evidence that the Bidder meets  
11 Supplemental Criteria 3-7 shall be provided by the Bidder as stated later in this Section.

12  
13  
14 **1. Delinquent State Taxes**

15  
16 A Criterion: The Bidder shall not owe delinquent taxes to the Washington State  
17 Department of Revenue without a payment plan approved by the Department of  
18 Revenue.

19  
20 B. Documentation: The Bidder, if and when required as detailed below, shall sign a  
21 statement (on a form to be provided by the Contracting Agency) that the Bidder does not  
22 owe delinquent taxes to the Washington State Department of Revenue, or if delinquent  
23 taxes are owed to the Washington State Department of Revenue, the Bidder must  
24 submit a written payment plan approved by the Department of Revenue, to the  
25 Contracting Agency by the deadline listed below.

26  
27 **2. Federal Debarment**

28  
29 A Criterion: The Bidder shall not currently be debarred or suspended by the Federal  
30 government.

31  
32 B. Documentation: The Bidder shall not be listed as having an “active exclusion” on the  
33 U.S. government’s “System for Award Management” database ([www.sam.gov](http://www.sam.gov)).

34  
35 **3. Subcontractor Responsibility**

36  
37 A Criterion: The Bidder’s standard subcontract form shall include the subcontractor  
38 responsibility language required by RCW 39.06.020, and the Bidder shall have an  
39 established procedure which it utilizes to validate the responsibility of each of its  
40 subcontractors. The Bidder’s subcontract form shall also include a requirement that  
41 each of its subcontractors shall have and document a similar procedure to determine  
42 whether the sub-tier subcontractors with whom it contracts are also “responsible”  
43 subcontractors as defined by RCW 39.06.020.

44  
45 B. Documentation: The Bidder, if and when required as detailed below, shall submit a copy  
46 of its standard subcontract form for review by the Contracting Agency, and a written  
47 description of its procedure for validating the responsibility of subcontractors with which  
48 it contracts.

49  
50 **4. Claims Against Retainage and Bonds**

51  
52 A Criterion: The Bidder shall not have a record of excessive claims filed against the  
53 retainage or payment bonds for public works projects in the three years prior to the bid

1 submittal date, that demonstrate a lack of effective management by the Bidder of making  
2 timely and appropriate payments to its subcontractors, suppliers, and workers, unless  
3 there are extenuating circumstances and such circumstances are deemed acceptable to  
4 the Contracting Agency.

5  
6 B. Documentation: The Bidder, if and when required as detailed below, shall submit a list of  
7 the public works projects completed in the three years prior to the bid submittal date that  
8 have had claims against retainage and bonds and include for each project the following  
9 information:

- 10
- 11 • Name of project
- 12 • The owner and contact information for the owner;
- 13 • A list of claims filed against the retainage and/or payment bond for any of the
- 14 projects listed;
- 15 • A written explanation of the circumstances surrounding each claim and the ultimate
- 16 resolution of the claim.

17  
18 **5. Public Bidding Crime**

19  
20 A. Criterion: The Bidder and/or its owners shall not have been convicted of a crime  
21 involving bidding on a public works contract in the five years prior to the bid submittal  
22 date.

23  
24 B. Documentation: The Bidder, if and when required as detailed below, shall sign a  
25 statement (on a form to be provided by the Contracting Agency) that the Bidder and/or  
26 its owners have not been convicted of a crime involving bidding on a public works  
27 contract.

28  
29 **6. Termination for Cause / Termination for Default**

30  
31 A. Criterion: The Bidder shall not have had any public works contract terminated for cause  
32 or terminated for default by a government agency in the five years prior to the bid  
33 submittal date, unless there are extenuating circumstances and such circumstances are  
34 deemed acceptable to the Contracting Agency.

35  
36 B. Documentation: The Bidder, if and when required as detailed below, shall sign a  
37 statement (on a form to be provided by the Contracting Agency) that the Bidder has not  
38 had any public works contract terminated for cause or terminated for default by a  
39 government agency in the five years prior to the bid submittal date; or if Bidder was  
40 terminated, describe the circumstances. .

41  
42 **7. Lawsuits**

43  
44 A. Criterion: The Bidder shall not have lawsuits with judgments entered against the Bidder  
45 in the five years prior to the bid submittal date that demonstrate a pattern of failing to  
46 meet the terms of contracts, unless there are extenuating circumstances and such  
47 circumstances are deemed acceptable to the Contracting Agency

48  
49 B. Documentation: The Bidder, if and when required as detailed below, shall sign a  
50 statement (on a form to be provided by the Contracting Agency) that the Bidder has not  
51 had any lawsuits with judgments entered against the Bidder in the five years prior to the  
52 bid submittal date that demonstrate a pattern of failing to meet the terms of contracts, or  
53 shall submit a list of all lawsuits with judgments entered against the Bidder in the five

1 years prior to the bid submittal date, along with a written explanation of the  
2 circumstances surrounding each such lawsuit. The Contracting Agency shall evaluate  
3 these explanations to determine whether the lawsuits demonstrate a pattern of failing to  
4 meet of terms of construction related contracts

5  
6 As evidence that the Bidder meets the Supplemental Criteria stated above, the apparent low  
7 Bidder must submit to the Contracting Agency by 12:00 P.M. (noon) of the second business day  
8 following the bid submittal deadline, a written statement verifying that the Bidder meets the  
9 supplemental criteria together with supporting documentation (sufficient in the sole judgment of  
10 the Contracting Agency) demonstrating compliance with the Supplemental Criteria. The  
11 Contracting Agency reserves the right to request further documentation as needed from the low  
12 Bidder and documentation from other Bidders as well to assess Bidder responsibility and  
13 compliance with all bidder responsibility criteria. The Contracting Agency also reserves the right  
14 to obtain information from third-parties and independent sources of information concerning a  
15 Bidder's compliance with the mandatory and supplemental criteria, and to use that information in  
16 their evaluation. The Contracting Agency may consider mitigating factors in determining whether  
17 the Bidder complies with the requirements of the supplemental criteria.

18  
19 The basis for evaluation of Bidder compliance with these mandatory and supplemental criteria  
20 shall include any documents or facts obtained by Contracting Agency (whether from the Bidder or  
21 third parties) including but not limited to: (i) financial, historical, or operational data from the  
22 Bidder; (ii) information obtained directly by the Contracting Agency from others for whom the  
23 Bidder has worked, or other public agencies or private enterprises; and (iii) any additional  
24 information obtained by the Contracting Agency which is believed to be relevant to the matter.

25  
26 If the Contracting Agency determines the Bidder does not meet the bidder responsibility criteria  
27 above and is therefore not a responsible Bidder, the Contracting Agency shall notify the Bidder in  
28 writing, with the reasons for its determination. If the Bidder disagrees with this determination, it  
29 may appeal the determination within two (2) business days of the Contracting Agency's  
30 determination by presenting its appeal and any additional information to the Contracting Agency.  
31 The Contracting Agency will consider the appeal and any additional information before issuing its  
32 final determination. If the final determination affirms that the Bidder is not responsible, the  
33 Contracting Agency will not execute a contract with any other Bidder until at least two business  
34 days after the Bidder determined to be not responsible has received the Contracting Agency's  
35 final determination.

36  
37 Request to Change Supplemental Bidder Responsibility Criteria Prior To Bid: Bidders with  
38 concerns about the relevancy or restrictiveness of the Supplemental Bidder Responsibility Criteria

5 melting and mixing of alloys to create the material occurred in a foreign country.

7 Manufacturing begins with the initial melting and mixing, and continues through the coating stage.

9 considered a manufacturing process. The processes include rolling, extruding, machining,

13 from the original reduction from ore to the finished product constitutes a manufacturing process for  
14 iron.

22 designated herein.

23  
24 Standard Federal Equal Employment Opportunity Construction Contract Specifications (Executive  
25 Order 11246)  
26

- 27 1. As used in these specifications:

- 28  
29 a. Covered Area means the geographical area described in the solicitation from which  
30 this contract resulted;  
31  
32 b. Director means Director, Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, United  
33 States Department of Labor, or any person to whom the Director delegates authority;  
34  
35 c. Employer Identification Number means the Federal Social Security number used on  
36 the Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return, U. S. Treasury Department Form 941;  
37  
38 d. Minority includes:  
39  
40 (1) Black, a person having origins in any of the Black Racial Groups of Africa.  
41  
42 (2) Hispanic, a fluent Spanish speaking, Spanish surnamed person of Mexican,  
43 Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central American, South American, or other Spanish  
44 origin.  
45  
46 (3) Asian or Pacific Islander, a person having origins in any of the original  
47 peoples of the Pacific rim or the Pacific Islands, the Hawaiian Islands and  
48 Samoa.  
49  
50 (4) American Indian or Alaskan Native, a person having origins in any of the  
51 original peoples of North America, and who maintain cultural identification  
52 through tribal affiliation or community recognition.  
53

- 1 2. Whenever the Contractor, or any Subcontractor at any tier, subcontracts a portion of the work  
2 involving any construction trade, it shall physically include in each subcontract in excess of  
3 \$10,000 the provisions of these specifications and the Notice which contains the applicable  
4 goals for minority and female participation and which is set forth in the solicitations from which  
5 this contract resulted.  
6
- 7 3. If the Contractor is participating (pursuant to 41 CFR 60-4.5) in a Hometown Plan approved by  
8 the U.S. Department of Labor in the covered area either individually or through an association,  
9 its affirmative action obligations on all work in the Plan area (including goals and timetables)  
10 shall be in accordance with that Plan for those trades which have unions participating in the  
11 Plan. Contractors must be able to demonstrate their participation in and compliance with the  
12 provisions of any such Hometown Plan. Each Contractor or Subcontractor participating in an  
13 approved Plan is individually required to comply with its obligations under the EEO clause, and  
14 to make a good faith effort to achieve each goal under the Plan in each trade in which it has  
15 employees. The overall good faith performance by other Contractors or Subcontractors toward  
16 a goal in an approved Plan does not excuse any covered Contractor's or Subcontractor's failure  
17 to take good faith effort to achieve the Plan goals and timetables.  
18
- 19 4. The Contractor shall implement the specific affirmative action standards provided in paragraphs  
20 7a through 7p of this Special Provision. The goals set forth in the solicitation from which this  
21 contract resulted are expressed as percentages of the total hours of employment and training  
22 of minority and female utilization the Contractor should reasonably be able to achieve in each  
23 construction trade in which it has employees in the covered area. Covered construction  
24 contractors performing construction work in geographical areas where they do not have a  
25 Federal or federally assisted construction contract shall apply the minority and female goals  
26 established for the geographical area where the work is being performed. The Contractor is  
27 expected to make substantially uniform progress in meeting its goals in each craft during the  
28 period specified.  
29
- 30 5. Neither the provisions of any collective bargaining agreement, nor the failure by a union with  
31 whom the Contractor has a collective bargaining agreement, to refer either minorities or women  
32 shall excuse the Contractor's obligations under these specifications, Executive Order 11246, or  
33 the regulations promulgated pursuant thereto.  
34
- 35 6. In order for the nonworking training hours of apprentices and trainees to be counted in meeting  
36 the goals, such apprentices and trainees must be employed by the Contractor during the training  
37 period, and the Contractor must have made a commitment to employ the apprentices and  
38 trainees at the completion of their training, subject to the availability of employment  
39 opportunities. Trainees must be trained pursuant to training programs approved by the U.S.  
40 Department of Labor.  
41
- 42 7. The Contractor shall take specific affirmative actions to ensure equal employment opportunity.  
43 The evaluation of the Contractor's compliance with these specifications shall be based upon its  
44 effort to achieve maximum results from its action. The Contractor shall document these efforts  
45 fully, and shall implement affirmative action steps at least as extensive as the following:  
46
  - 47 a. Ensure and maintain a working environment free of harassment, intimidation, and  
48 coercion at all sites, and in all facilities at which the Contractor's employees are  
49 assigned to work. The Contractor, where possible, will assign two or more women to  
50 each construction project. The Contractor shall specifically ensure that all foremen,  
51 superintendents, and other on-site supervisory personnel are aware of and carry out  
52 the Contractor's obligation to maintain such a working environment, with specific  
53 attention to minority or female individuals working at such sites or in such facilities.

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- b. Establish and maintain a current list of minority and female recruitment sources, provide written notification to minority and female recruitment sources and to community organizations when the Contractor or its unions have employment opportunities available, and maintain a record of the organizations' responses.
  - c. Maintain a current file of the names, addresses and telephone numbers of each minority and female off-the-street applicant and minority or female referral from a union, a recruitment source or community organization and of what action was taken with respect to each such individual. If such individual was sent to the union hiring hall for referral and was not referred back to the Contractor by the union or, if referred, not employed by the Contractor, this shall be documented in the file with the reason therefor, along with whatever additional actions the Contractor may have taken.
  - d. Provide immediate written notification to the Director when the union or unions with which the Contractor has a collective bargaining agreement has not referred to the Contractor a minority person or woman sent by the Contractor, or when the Contractor has other information that the union referral process has impeded the Contractor's efforts to meet its obligations.
  - e. Develop on-the-job training opportunity and/or participate in training programs for the area which expressly include minorities and women, including upgrading programs and apprenticeship and trainee programs relevant to the Contractor's employment needs, especially those programs funded or approved by the U.S. Department of Labor. The Contractor shall provide notice of these programs to the sources compiled under 7b above.
  - f. Disseminate the Contractor's EEO policy by providing notice of the policy to unions and training programs and requesting their cooperation in assisting the Contractor in meeting its EEO obligations; by including it in any policy manual and collective bargaining agreement; by publicizing it in the company newspaper, annual report, etc.; by specific review of the policy with all management personnel and with all minority and female employees at least once a year; and by posting the company EEO policy on bulletin boards accessible to all employees at each location where construction work is performed.
  - g. Review, at least annually, the company's EEO policy and affirmative action obligations under these specifications with all employees having any responsibility for hiring, assignment, layoff, termination or other employment decisions including specific review of these items with on-site supervisory personnel such as Superintendents, General Foremen, etc., prior to the initiation of construction work at any job site. A written record shall be made and maintained identifying the time and place of these meetings, persons attending, subject matter discussed, and disposition of the subject matter.
  - h. Disseminate the Contractor's EEO policy externally by including it in any advertising in the news media, specifically including minority and female news media, and providing written notification to and discussing the Contractor's EEO policy with other Contractors and Subcontractors with whom the Contractor does or anticipates doing business.
  - i. Direct its recruitment efforts, both oral and written to minority, female and community organizations, to schools with minority and female students and to minority and female

1 recruitment and training organizations serving the Contractor's recruitment area and  
2 employment needs. Not later than one month prior to the date for the acceptance of  
3 applications for apprenticeship or other training by any recruitment source, the  
4 Contractor shall send written notification to organizations such as the above,  
5 describing the openings, screening procedures, and tests to be used in the selection  
6 process.

- 7
- 8 j. Encourage present minority and female employees to recruit other minority persons  
9 and women and where reasonable, provide after school, summer and vacation  
10 employment to minority and female youth both on the site and in other areas of a  
11 Contractor's work force.
- 12
- 13 k. Validate all tests and other selection requirements where there is an obligation to do  
14 so under 41 CFR Part 60-3.
- 15
- 16 l. Conduct, at least annually, an inventory and evaluation of all minority and female  
17 personnel for promotional opportunities and encourage these employees to seek or to  
18 prepare for, through appropriate training, etc., such opportunities.
- 19
- 20 m. Ensure that seniority practices, job classifications, work assignments and other  
21 personnel practices, do not have a discriminatory effect by continually monitoring all  
22 personnel and employment related activities to ensure that the EEO policy and the  
23 Contractor's obligations under these specifications are being carried out.
- 24
- 25 n. Ensure that all facilities and company activities are nonsegregated except that  
26 separate or single-user toilet and necessary changing facilities shall be provided to  
27 assure privacy between the sexes.
- 28
- 29 o. Document and maintain a record of all solicitations of offers for subcontracts from  
30 minority and female construction contractors and suppliers, including circulation of  
31 solicitations to minority and female contractor associations and other business  
32 associations.
- 33
- 34 p. Conduct a review, at least annually, of all supervisors' adherence to and performance  
35 under the Contractor's EEO policies and affirmative action obligations.
- 36

37 8. Contractors are encouraged to participate in voluntary associations which assist in fulfilling one  
38 or more of their affirmative action obligations (7a through 7p). The efforts of a contractor  
39 association, joint contractor-union, contractor-community, or other similar group of which the  
40 Contractor is a member and participant, may be asserted as fulfilling any one or more of the  
41 obligations under 7a through 7p of this Special Provision provided that the Contractor actively  
42 participates in the group, makes every effort to assure that the group has a positive impact on  
43 the employment of minorities and women in the industry, ensure that the concrete benefits of  
44 the program are reflected in the Contractor's minority and female work-force participation,  
45 makes a good faith effort to meet its individual goals and timetables, and can provide access to  
46 documentation which demonstrate the effectiveness of actions taken on behalf of the  
47 Contractor. The obligation to comply, however, is the Contractor's and failure of such a group  
48 to fulfill an obligation shall not be a defense for the Contractor's noncompliance.

49

50 9. A single goal for minorities and a separate single goal for women have been established. The  
51 Contractor, however, is required to provide equal employment opportunity and to take  
52 affirmative action for all minority groups, both male and female, and all women, both minority  
53 and non-minority. Consequently, the Contractor may be in violation of the Executive Order if a

1 particular group is employed in substantially disparate manner (for example, even though the  
2 Contractor has achieved its goals for women generally, the Contractor may be in violation of the  
3 Executive Order if a specific minority group of women is underutilized).

- 5 10. The Contractor shall not use the goals and timetables or affirmative action standards to  
6 discriminate against any person because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin.
- 7
- 8 11. The Contractor shall not enter into any subcontract with any person or firm debarred from  
9 Government contracts pursuant to Executive Order 11246.
- 10
- 11 12. The Contractor shall carry out such sanctions and penalties for violation of these specifications  
12 and of the Equal Opportunity Clause, including suspensions, terminations and cancellations of  
13 existing subcontracts as may be imposed or ordered pursuant to Executive Order 11246, as  
14 amended, and its implementing regulations by the Office of Federal Contract Compliance  
15 Programs. Any Contractor who fails to carry out such sanctions and penalties shall be in  
16 violation of these specifications and Executive Order 11246, as amended.
- 17
- 18 13. The Contractor, in fulfilling its obligations under these specifications, shall implement specific  
19 affirmative action steps, at least as extensive as those standards prescribed in paragraph 7 of  
20 this Special Provision, so as to achieve maximum results from its efforts to ensure equal  
21 employment opportunity. If the Contractor fails to comply with the requirements of the Executive  
22 Order, the implementing regulations, or these specifications, the Director shall proceed in  
23 accordance with 41 CFR 60-4.8.
- 24
- 25 14. The Contractor shall designate a responsible official to monitor all employment related activity  
26 to ensure that the company EEO policy is being carried out, to submit reports relating to the  
27 provisions hereof as may be required by the government and to keep records. Records shall at  
28 least include, for each employee, their name, address, telephone numbers, construction trade,  
29 union affiliation if any, employee identification number when assigned, social security number,  
30 race, sex, status (e.g., mechanic, apprentice, trainee, helper, or laborer), dates of changes in  
31 status, hours worked per week in the indicated trade, rate of pay, and locations at which the  
32 work was performed. Records shall be maintained in an easily understandable and retrievable  
33 form; however, to the degree that existing records satisfy this requirement, the Contractors will  
34 not be required to maintain separate records.
- 35
- 36 15. Nothing herein provided shall be construed as a limitation upon the application of other laws  
37 which establish different standards of compliance or upon the application of requirements for  
38 the hiring of local or other area residents (e.g., those under the Public Works Employment Act  
39 of 1977 and the Community Development Block Grant Program).
- 40
- 41 16. Additional assistance for Federal Construction Contractors on contracts administered by  
42 Washington State Department of Transportation or by Local Agencies may be found at:

6 **(April 3, 2018)**

7 ***Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Participation***

8 The Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) requirements of 49 CFR Part 26 and USDOT's  
9 official interpretations (i.e., Questions & Answers) apply to this Contract. As such, the requirements  
10 of this Contract are to make affirmative efforts to solicit DBEs, provide information on who  
11 submitted a Bid or quote and to report DBE participation monthly as described elsewhere in these  
12 Contract Provisions. No preference will be included in the evaluation of Bids/Proposals, no  
13 minimum level of DBE participation shall be required as a Condition of Award and Bids/Proposals  
14 may not be rejected or considered non-responsive on that basis.

15  
16 **DBE Abbreviations and Definitions**

17 **Broker** – A business firm that provides a bona fide service, such as professional,  
18 technical, consultant or managerial services and assistance in the procurement of  
19 essential personnel, facilities, equipment, materials, or supplies required for the  
20 performance of the Contract, or, persons/companies who arrange or expedite  
21 transactions.

22  
23 **Certified Business Description** – Specific descriptions of work the DBE is certified to  
24 perform, as identified in the Certified Firm Directory, under the Vendor Information page.

25  
26 **Certified Firm Directory** – A database of all Minority, Women, and Disadvantaged  
27 Business Enterprises. The on-line Directory is available to Contractors for their use in  
28 identifying and soliciting interest from DBE firms. The database is located under the Firm  
29 Certification section of the Diversity Management and Compliance System web page at:  
30 <https://omwbe.diversitycompliance.com>.

31  
32 **Commercially Useful Function (CUF)**

33 49 CFR 26.55(c)(1) defines commercially useful function as: *“A DBE performs a*  
34 *commercially useful function when it is responsible for execution of the work of the*  
35 *contract and is carrying out its responsibilities by actually performing, managing, and*  
36 *supervising the work involved. To perform a commercially useful function, the DBE must*  
37 *also be responsible, with respect to materials and supplies used on the contract, for*  
38 *negotiating price, determining quality and quantity, ordering the material, and installing*  
39 *(where applicable) and paying for the material itself. To determine whether a DBE is*  
40 *performing a commercially useful function, you must evaluate the amount of work*  
41 *subcontracted, industry practices, whether the amount the firm is to be paid under the*  
42 *contract is commensurate with the work it is actually performing and the DBE credit*  
43 *claimed for its performance of the work, and other relevant factors.”*

44  
45 **Contract** – For this Special Provision only, this definition supplements Section 1-01.3. 49  
46 CFR 26.5 defines contract as: *“... a legally binding relationship obligating a seller to*  
47 *furnish supplies or services (including, but not limited to, construction and professional*  
48 *services) and the buyer to pay for them. For purposes of this part, a lease is considered*  
49 *to be a contract.”*

50  
51 **Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE)** – A business firm certified by the  
52 Washington State Office of Minority and Women's Business Enterprises, as meeting the  
53 criteria outlined in 49 CFR 26 regarding DBE certification. A Underutilized Disadvantaged  
54 Business Enterprise (UDBE) firm is a subset of DBE.

1 **Force Account Work** – Work measured and paid in accordance with Section 1-09.6.

2  
3 **Manufacturer (DBE)** – A DBE firm that operates or maintains a factory or establishment  
4 that produces on the premises the materials, supplies, articles, or equipment required  
5 under the Contract. A DBE Manufacturer shall produce finished goods or products from  
6 raw or unfinished material or purchase and substantially alters goods and materials to  
7 make them suitable for construction use before reselling them.

8  
9 **Regular Dealer (DBE)** – A DBE firm that owns, operates, or maintains a store,  
10 warehouse, or other establishment in which the materials or supplies required for the  
11 performance of a Contract are bought, kept in stock, and regularly sold to the public in the  
12 usual course of business. To be a Regular Dealer, the DBE firm must be an established  
13 regular business that engages in as its principal business and in its own name the  
14 purchase and sale of the products in question. A Regular Dealer in such items as steel,  
15 cement, gravel, stone, and petroleum products need not own, operate or maintain a place  
16 of business if it both owns and operates distribution equipment for the products. Any  
17 supplementing of regular dealers' own distribution equipment shall be by long-term formal  
18 lease agreements and not on an ad-hoc basis. Brokers, packagers, manufacturers'  
19 representatives, or other persons who arrange or expedite transactions shall not be  
20 regarded as Regular Dealers within the meaning of this definition.

21  
22 **DBE Goals**

23 No DBE goals have been assigned as part of this Contract.

24  
25 **Affirmative Efforts to Solicit DBE Participation**

26 The Contractor shall not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, sex, national origin, age,  
27 or disability in the selection and retention of subcontractors, including procurement of  
28 materials and leases of equipment. DBE firms shall have an equal opportunity to compete for  
29 subcontracts in which the Contractor enters into pursuant to this Contract.

30  
31 Contractors are encouraged to:

- 32  
33 1. Advertise opportunities for Subcontractors or suppliers in a timely and reasonably  
34 designed manner to provide notice of the opportunity to DBEs capable of performing  
35 the Work. All advertisements should include a Contract Provision encouraging  
36 participation by DBE firms. This may be accomplished through general  
37 advertisements (e.g. newspapers, journals, etc.) or by soliciting Bids/Proposals  
38 directly from DBEs.
- 39  
40 2. Establish delivery schedules that encourage participation by DBEs and other small  
41 businesses.
- 42  
43 3. Participate with a DBE as a joint venture.

44  
45 **DBE Eligibility/Selection of DBEs for Reporting Purposes Only**

46 Contractor may take credit for DBEs utilized on this Contract only if the firm is certified for the  
47 Work being performed, and the firm performs a commercially useful function (CUF).

48  
49 Absent a mandatory goal, all DBE participation that is attained on this project will be  
50 considered as "race neutral" participation and shall be reported as such.

51  
52 **Crediting DBE Participation**

53 All DBE Subcontractors shall be certified before the subcontract on which they are  
54 participating is executed.

1 Be advised that although a firm is listed in the directory, there are cases where the listed firm  
2 is in a temporary suspension status. The Contractor shall review the OMWBE Suspended  
3 DBE Firms list. A DBE firm that is included on this list may not enter into new contracts that  
4 count towards participation.

5  
6 DBE participation is only credited upon payment to the DBE.

7  
8 The following are some definitions of what may be counted as DBE participation.

9  
10 **DBE Prime Contractor**

11 Only take credit for that portion of the total dollar value of the Contract equal to the  
12 distinct, clearly defined portion of the Work that the DBE Prime Contractor performs with  
13 its own forces and is certified to perform.

14  
15 **DBE Subcontractor**

16 Only take credit for that portion of the total dollar value of the subcontract equal to the  
17 distinct, clearly defined portion of the Work that the DBE performs with its own forces.  
18 The value of work performed by the DBE includes the cost of supplies and materials  
19 purchased by the DBE and equipment leased by the DBE, for its work on the contract.  
20 Supplies, materials or equipment obtained by a DBE that are not utilized or incorporated  
21 in the contract work by the DBE will not be eligible for DBE credit.

22  
23 The supplies, materials, and equipment purchased or leased from the Contractor or its  
24 affiliate, including any Contractor's resources available to DBE subcontractors at no cost,  
25 shall not be credited.

26  
27 DBE credit will not be given in instances where the equipment lease includes the  
28 operator. The DBE is expected to operate the equipment used in the performance of its  
29 work under the contract with its own forces. Situations where equipment is leased and  
30 used by the DBE, but payment is deducted from the Contractor's payment to the DBE is  
31 not allowed.

32  
33 If a DBE subcontracts a portion of the Work of its contract to another firm, the value of the  
34 subcontracted Work may be credited only if the DBE's Lower-Tier Subcontractor is also a  
35 DBE. Work subcontracted to a non-DBE shall not be credited.

36  
37 Count expenditures toward race/gender-neutral participation only if the DBE is performing  
38 a CUF on the contract.

39  
40 **DBE Subcontract and Lower Tier Subcontract Documents**

41 There must be a subcontract agreement that complies with 49 CFR Part 26 and fully  
42 describes the distinct elements of Work committed to be performed by the DBE. The  
43 subcontract agreement shall incorporate requirements of the primary Contract.  
44 Subcontract agreements of all tiers, including lease agreements shall be readily available  
45 at the project site for the Engineer review.

46  
47 **DBE Service Provider**

48 The value of fees or commissions charged by a DBE Broker, a DBE behaving in a  
49 manner of a Broker, or another service provider for providing a bona fide service, such as  
50 professional, technical, consultant, managerial services, or for providing bonds or  
51 insurance specifically required for the performance of the contract will only be credited as  
52 DBE participation, if the fee/commission is determined by the Contracting Agency to be  
53 reasonable and the firm has performed a CUF.



1 **Temporary Traffic Control**

2 If the DBE firm is being utilized in the capacity of only “Flagging”, the DBE firm must  
3 provide a Traffic Control Supervisor (TCS) and flagger, which are under the direct control  
4 of the DBE. The DBE firm shall also provide all flagging equipment (e.g. paddles, hard  
5 hats, and vests).

6  
7 If the DBE firm is being utilized in the capacity of “Traffic Control Services”, the DBE firm  
8 must provide a TCS, flaggers, and traffic control items (e.g., cones, barrels, signs, etc.)  
9 and be in total control of all items in implementing the traffic control for the project. In  
10 addition, if the DBE firm utilizes the Contractor’s equipment, such as Transportable  
11 Attenuators and Portable Changeable Message Signs (PCMS) no DBE credit can be  
12 taken for supplying and operating the items.

13  
14 **Trucking**

15 DBE trucking firm participation may only be credited as DBE participation for the value of  
16 the hauling services, not for the materials being hauled unless the trucking firm is also  
17 certified as a supplier. In situations where the DBE’s work is priced per ton, the value of  
18 the hauling service must be calculated separately from the value of the materials in order  
19 to determine DBE credit for hauling.

20  
21 The DBE trucking firm must own and operate at least one licensed, insured and  
22 operational truck on the contract. The truck must be of the type that is necessary to  
23 perform the hauling duties required under the contract. The DBE receives credit for the  
24 value of the transportation services it provides on the Contract using trucks it owns or  
25 leases, licenses, insures, and operates with drivers it employs.

26  
27 The DBE may lease additional trucks from another DBE firm. The Work that a DBE  
28 trucking firm performs with trucks it leases from other certified DBE trucking firms qualify  
29 for 100% DBE credit

30  
31 The trucking Work subcontracted to any non-DBE trucking firm will not receive credit for  
32 Work done on the project. The DBE may lease trucks from a non-DBE truck leasing  
33 company, but can only receive credit as DBE participation if the DBE uses its own  
34 employees as drivers.

35  
36 DBE credit for a truck broker is limited to the fee/commission that the DBE receives for  
37 arranging transportation services.

38  
39 Truck registration and lease agreements shall be readily available at the project site for  
40 the Engineer review.

41  
42 **DBE Manufacturer and DBE Regular Dealer**

43 One hundred percent (100%) of the cost of the manufactured product obtained from a  
44 DBE Manufacturer can count as DBE participation.

45  
46 Sixty percent (60%) of the cost of materials or supplies purchased from a DBE Regular  
47 Dealer may be credited as DBE participation. If the role of the DBE Regular Dealer is  
48 determined to be that of a pass-through, then no DBE credit will be given for its services.  
49 If the role of the DBE Regular Dealer is determined to be that of a Broker, then DBE  
50 credit shall be limited to the fee or commission it receives for its services. Regular Dealer  
51 status and the amount of credit is determined on a Contract-by-Contract basis.

52  
53 Regular Dealer DBE firms must be approved before being used on a project. The  
54 WSDOT Approved Regular Dealer list published on WSDOT’s Office of Equal  
55 Opportunity (OEO) web site must include the specific project for which approval is being

1 requested. The Regular Dealer must submit the Regular Dealer Status Request form a  
2 minimum of five days prior to being utilized on the specific project.

3  
4 Purchase of materials or supplies from a DBE which is neither a manufacturer nor a  
5 regular dealer, (i.e. Broker) only the fees or commissions charged for assistance in the  
6 procurement of the materials and supplies, or fees or transportation charges for the  
7 delivery of materials or supplies required on a job site, can count as DBE participation  
8 provided the fees are not excessive as compared with fees customarily allowed for similar  
9 services. Documentation will be required to support the fee/commission charged by the  
10 DBE. The cost of the materials and supplies themselves cannot be counted toward as  
11 DBE participation.

12  
13 Note: Requests to be listed as a Regular Dealer will only be processed if the requesting  
14 firm is a material supplier certified by the Office of Minority and Women's  
15 Business Enterprises in a NAICS code that falls within the 42XXXX NAICS  
16 Wholesale code section.

17  
18 **Procedures Between Award and Execution**

19 After Award and prior to Execution, the Contractor shall provide the additional information  
20 described below. Failure to comply shall result in the forfeiture of the Bidder's Proposal bond  
21 or deposit.

- 22  
23 1. A list of all firms who submitted a bid or quote in attempt to participate in this project  
24 whether they were successful or not. Include the business name and mailing  
25 address.

26  
27 Note: The firms identified by the Contractor may be contacted by the  
28 Contracting Agency to solicit general information as follows: age of the  
29 firm and average of its gross annual receipts over the past three-years.

30  
31 **Procedures After Execution**

32 **Commercially Useful Function (CUF)**

33 The Contractor may only take credit for the payments made for Work performed by a  
34 DBE that is determined to be performing a CUF. Payment must be commensurate with  
35 the work actually performed by the DBE. This applies to all DBEs performing Work on a  
36 project, whether or not the DBEs are COA, if the Contractor wants to receive credit for  
37 their participation. The Engineer will conduct CUF reviews to ascertain whether DBEs are  
38 performing a CUF. A DBE performs a CUF when it is carrying out its responsibilities of its  
39 contract by actually performing, managing, and supervising the Work involved. The DBE  
40 must be responsible for negotiating price; determining quality and quantity; ordering the  
41 material, installing (where applicable); and paying for the material itself. If a DBE does  
42 not perform "all" of these functions on a furnish-and-install contract, it has not performed a  
43 CUF and the cost of materials cannot be counted toward UDBE COA Goal. Leasing of  
44 equipment from a leasing company is allowed. However, leasing/purchasing equipment  
45 from the Contractor is not allowed. Lease agreements shall be readily available for  
46 review by the Engineer.

47  
48 In order for a DBE traffic control company to be considered to be performing a CUF, the  
49 DBE must be in control of its work inclusive of supervision. The DBE shall employ a  
50 Traffic Control Supervisor who is directly involved in the management and supervision of  
51 the traffic control employees and services.

52  
53 The DBE does not perform a CUF if its role is limited to that of an extra participant in a  
54 transaction, contract, or project through which the funds are passed in order to obtain the  
55 appearance of DBE participation.

1  
2 The following are some of the factors that the Engineer will use in determining whether a  
3 DBE trucking company is performing a CUF:  
4

- 5 • The DBE shall be responsible for the management and supervision of the entire  
6 trucking operation for which it is responsible on the Contract. The owner  
7 demonstrates business related knowledge, shows up on site and is determined  
8 to be actively running the business.  
9
- 10 • The DBE shall with its own workforce, operate at least one fully licensed,  
11 insured, and operational truck used on the Contract. The drivers of the trucks  
12 owned and leased by the DBE must be exclusively employed by the DBE and  
13 reflected on the DBE's payroll.  
14
- 15 • Lease agreements for trucks shall indicate that the DBE has exclusive use of  
16 and control over the truck(s). This does not preclude the leased truck from  
17 working for others provided it is with the consent of the DBE and the lease  
18 provides the DBE absolute priority for use of the leased truck.  
19
- 20 • Leased trucks shall display the name and identification number of the DBE.  
21

### 22 **Joint Checking**

23 A joint check is a check between a Subcontractor and the Contractor to the supplier of  
24 materials/supplies. The check is issued by the Contractor as payer to the Subcontractor  
25 and the material supplier jointly for items to be incorporated into the project. The DBE  
26 must release the check to the supplier, while the Contractor acts solely as the guarantor.  
27

28 A joint check agreement must be approved by the Engineer and requested by the DBE  
29 involved using the DBE Joint Check Request Form (form # 272-053) prior to its use. The  
30 form must accompany the DBE Joint Check Agreement between the parties involved,  
31 including the conditions of the arrangement and expected use of the joint checks.  
32

33 The approval to use joint checks and the use will be closely monitored by the Engineer.  
34 To receive DBE credit for performing a CUF with respect to obtaining materials and  
35 supplies, a DBE must "be responsible for negotiating price, determining quality and  
36 quantity, ordering the material and installing and paying for the material itself." The  
37 Contractor shall submit DBE Joint Check Request Form for the Engineer approval prior to  
38 using a joint check.  
39

40 Material costs paid by the Contractor directly to the material supplier is not allowed. If  
41 proper procedures are not followed or the Engineer determines that the arrangement  
42 results in lack of independence for the DBE involved, no DBE credit will be given for the  
43 DBE's participation as it relates to the material cost.  
44

### 45 **Prompt Payment**

46 Prompt payment to all subcontractors shall be in accordance with Section 1-08.1. Prompt  
47 Payment requirements apply to progress payments as well as return of retainage.  
48

### 49 **Reporting**

50 The Contractor and all subcontractors/suppliers/service providers that utilize DBEs to  
51 perform work on the project, shall maintain appropriate records that will enable the  
52 Engineer to verify DBE participation throughout the life of the project.  
53

54 Refer to Section 1-08.1 for additional reporting requirements associated with this  
55 Contract.

1  
2 **Decertification**

3 When a DBE is “decertified” from the DBE program during the course of the Contract, the  
4 participation of that DBE shall continue to count as DBE participation as long as the  
5 subcontract with the DBE was executed prior to the decertification notice. The Contractor  
6 is obligated to substitute when a DBE does not have an executed subcontract agreement  
7 at the time of decertification.  
8

9 **Consequences of Non-Compliance**

10 Each contract with a Contractor (and each subcontract the Contractor signs with a  
11 Subcontractor) must include the following assurance clause:  
12

13 The Contractor, subrecipient, or Subcontractor shall not discriminate on the basis of race,  
14 color, national origin, or sex in the performance of this contract. The Contractor shall  
15 carry out applicable requirements of 49 CFR Part 26 in the award and administration of  
16 DOT-assisted contracts. Failure by the Contractor to carry out these requirements is a  
17 material breach of this contract, which may result in the termination of this contract or  
18 such other remedy as the recipient deems appropriate, which may include, but is not  
19 limited to:  
20

- 21 (1) Withholding monthly progress payments;
- 22 (2) Assessing sanctions;
- 23 (3) Liquidated damages; and/or
- 24 (4) Disqualifying the Contractor from future bidding as non-responsible.  
25  
26  
27  
28

29 **Payment**

30 Compensation for all costs involved with complying with the conditions of this  
31 Specification and any other associated DBE requirements is included in payment for the  
32 associated Contract items of Work, except otherwise provided in the Specifications.  
33

34 **1-07.12 Federal Agency Inspection**

35 Section 1-07.12 is supplemented with the following:  
36

37 ***(January 25, 2016)***

38 ***Required Federal Aid Provisions***

39 The Required Contract Provisions Federal Aid Construction Contracts (FHWA 1273) Revised May  
40 1, 2012 and the amendments thereto supersede any conflicting provisions of the Standard  
41 Specifications and are made a part of this Contract; provided, however, that if any of the provisions  
42 of FHWA 1273, as amended, are less restrictive than Washington State Law, then the Washington  
43 State Law shall prevail.  
44

45 The provisions of FHWA 1273, as amended, included in this Contract require that the Contractor  
46 insert the FHWA 1273 and amendments thereto in each Subcontract, together with the wage rates  
47 which are part of the FHWA 1273, as amended. Also, a clause shall be included in each  
48 Subcontract requiring the Subcontractors to insert the FHWA 1273 and amendments thereto in any  
49 lower tier Subcontracts, together with the wage rates. The Contractor shall also ensure that this  
50 section, REQUIRED FEDERAL AID PROVISIONS, is inserted in each Subcontract for  
51 Subcontractors and lower tier Subcontractors. For this purpose, upon request to the Engineer, the  
52 Contractor will be provided with extra copies of the FHWA 1273, the amendments thereto, the  
53 applicable wage rates, and this Special Provision.  
54

1 **1-07.18 Public Liability and Property Damage Insurance**

2  
3 Delete this section in its entirety, and replace it with the following:

4  
5 **1-07.18 Insurance**

6 *(January 4, 2016 APWA GSP)*

7  
8 **1-07.18(1) General Requirements**

- 9 A. The Contractor shall procure and maintain the insurance described in all subsections of section 1-  
10 07.18 of these Special Provisions, from insurers with a current A. M. Best rating of not less than A-:  
11 VII and licensed to do business in the State of Washington. The Contracting Agency reserves the  
12 right to approve or reject the insurance provided, based on the insurer's financial condition.
- 13  
14 B. The Contractor shall keep this insurance in force without interruption from the commencement of the  
15 Contractor's Work through the term of the Contract and for thirty (30) days after the Physical  
16 Completion date, unless otherwise indicated below.
- 17  
18 C. If any insurance policy is written on a claims made form, its retroactive date, and that of all subsequent  
19 renewals, shall be no later than the effective date of this Contract. The policy shall state that coverage  
20 is claims made, and state the retroactive date. Claims-made form coverage shall be maintained by  
21 the Contractor for a minimum of 36 months following the Completion Date or earlier termination of  
22 this Contract, and the Contractor shall annually provide the Contracting Agency with proof of renewal.  
23 If renewal of the claims made form of coverage becomes unavailable, or economically prohibitive, the  
24 Contractor shall purchase an extended reporting period ("tail") or execute another form of guarantee  
25 acceptable to the Contracting Agency to assure financial responsibility for liability for services  
26 performed.
- 27  
28 D. The Contractor's Automobile Liability, Commercial General Liability and Excess or Umbrella  
29 Liability insurance policies shall be primary and non-contributory insurance as respects the  
30 Contracting Agency's insurance, self-insurance, or self-insured pool coverage. Any insurance, self-  
31 insurance, or self-insured pool coverage maintained by the Contracting Agency shall be excess of  
32 the Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- 33  
34 E. The Contractor shall provide the Contracting Agency and all additional insureds with written  
35 notice of any policy cancellation, within two business days of their receipt of such notice.
- 36  
37 F. The Contractor shall not begin work under the Contract until the required insurance has been obtained  
38 and approved by the Contracting Agency
- 39  
40 G. Failure on the part of the Contractor to maintain the insurance as required shall constitute a material  
41 breach of contract, upon which the Contracting Agency may, after giving five business days' notice  
42 to the Contractor to correct the breach, immediately terminate the Contract or, at its discretion,  
43 procure or renew such insurance and pay any and all premiums in connection therewith, with any  
44 sums so expended to be repaid to the Contracting Agency on demand, or at the sole discretion of the  
45 Contracting Agency, offset against funds due the Contractor from the Contracting Agency.
- 46  
47 H. All costs for insurance shall be incidental to and included in the unit or lump sum prices of the Contract  
48 and no additional payment will be made.

49  
50 **1-07.18(2) Additional Insured**

51 All insurance policies, with the exception of Workers Compensation, and of Professional Liability and  
52 Builder's Risk (if required by this Contract) shall name the following listed entities as additional insured(s)  
53 using the forms or endorsements required herein:

- 54     ▪ the Contracting Agency and its officers, elected officials, employees, agents, and volunteers

4   The above-listed entities shall be additional insured(s) for the full available limits of liability maintained  
5   by the Contractor, irrespective of whether such limits maintained by the Contractor are greater than  
6   those required by this Contract, and irrespective of whether the Certificate of Insurance provided by the  
7   Contractor pursuant to 1-07.18(4) describes limits lower than those maintained by the Contractor.

8  
9   For Commercial General Liability insurance coverage, the required additional insured endorsements  
10  shall be at least as broad as ISO forms CG 20 10 10 01 for ongoing operations and CG 20 37 10 01 for  
11  completed operations.

### 12 13 **1-07.18(3) Subcontractors**

14  The Contractor shall cause each Subcontractor of every tier to provide insurance coverage  
15  that complies with all applicable requirements of the Contractor-provided insurance as set forth  
16  herein, except the Contractor shall have sole responsibility for determining the limits of  
17  coverage required to be obtained by Subcontractors.

18  
19  The Contractor shall ensure that all Subcontractors of every tier add all entities listed in 1-07.18(2) as  
20  additional insureds, and provide proof of such on the policies as required by that section as detailed in  
21  1-07.18(2) using an endorsement as least as broad as ISO CG 20 10 10 01 for ongoing operations and  
22  CG 20 37 10 01 for completed operations.

23  
24  Upon request by the Contracting Agency, the Contractor shall forward to the Contracting Agency  
25  evidence of insurance and copies of the additional insured endorsements of each Subcontractor of  
26  every tier as required in 1-07.18(4) Verification of Coverage.

### 27 28 **1-07.18(4) Verification of Coverage**

29  The Contractor shall deliver to the Contracting Agency a Certificate(s) of Insurance and endorsements  
30  for each policy of insurance meeting the requirements set forth herein when the Contractor delivers the  
31  signed Contract for the work. Failure of Contracting Agency to demand such verification of coverage  
32  with these insurance requirements or failure of Contracting Agency to identify a deficiency from the  
33  insurance documentation provided shall not be construed as a waiver of Contractor's obligation to  
34  maintain such insurance.

35  
36  Verification of coverage shall include:

- 37  1. An ACORD certificate or a form determined by the Contracting Agency to be equivalent.
- 38  2. Copies of all endorsements naming Contracting Agency and all other entities listed in 1-07.18(2) as  
39  additional insured(s), showing the policy number. The Contractor may submit a copy of any blanket  
40  additional insured clause from its policies instead of a separate endorsement.
- 41  3. Any other amendatory endorsements to show the coverage required herein.
- 42  4. A notation of coverage enhancements on the Certificate of Insurance shall not satisfy these  
43  requirements – actual endorsements must be submitted.

44  
45  Upon request by the Contracting Agency, the Contractor shall forward to the Contracting Agency a full  
46  and certified copy of the insurance policy(s). If Builders Risk insurance is required on this Project, a full  
47  and certified copy of that policy is required when the Contractor delivers the signed Contract for the  
48  work.

### 49 50 **1-07.18(5) Coverages and Limits**

51  The insurance shall provide the minimum coverages and limits set forth below. Contractor's  
52  maintenance of insurance, its scope of coverage, and limits as required herein shall not be construed to

1 limit the liability of the Contractor to the coverage provided by such insurance, or otherwise limit the  
2 Contracting Agency's recourse to any remedy available at law or in equity.

3  
4 All deductibles and self-insured retentions must be disclosed and are subject to approval by the  
5 Contracting Agency. The cost of any claim payments falling within the deductible or self-insured  
6 retention shall be the responsibility of the Contractor. In the event an additional insured incurs a liability  
7 subject to any policy's deductibles or self-insured retention, said deductibles or self-insured retention  
8 shall be the responsibility of the Contractor.

9  
10 **1-07.18(5)A Commercial General Liability**

11 Commercial General Liability insurance shall be written on coverage forms at least as broad as ISO  
12 occurrence form CG 00 01, including but not limited to liability arising from premises, operations, stop  
13 gap liability, independent contractors, products-completed operations, personal and advertising injury,  
14 and liability assumed under an insured contract. There shall be no exclusion for liability arising from  
15 explosion, collapse or underground property damage.

16  
17 The Commercial General Liability insurance shall be endorsed to provide a per project general  
18 aggregate limit, using ISO form CG 25 03 05 09 or an equivalent endorsement.

19  
20 Contractor shall maintain Commercial General Liability Insurance arising out of the Contractor's  
21 completed operations for at least three years following Substantial Completion of the Work.

23 Such policy must provide the following minimum limits:

30 **1-07.18(5)B Automobile Liability**

31 Automobile Liability shall cover owned, non-owned, hired, and leased vehicles; and shall be written on  
32 a coverage form at least as broad as ISO form CA 00 01. If the work involves the transport of  
33 pollutants, the automobile liability policy shall include MCS 90 and CA 99 48 endorsements.

34  
35 Such policy must provide the following minimum limit:

38 **1-07.18(5)C Workers' Compensation**

39 The Contractor shall comply with Workers' Compensation coverage as required by the Industrial  
40 Insurance laws of the State of Washington.

41  
42 **1-07.23 Public Convenience And Safety**

43  
44 **1-07.23(1) Construction Under Traffic**

45 Section 1-07.23(1) is supplemented with the following:

46  
47 (February 3, 2020)

48 **Work Zone Clear Zone**

49 The Work Zone Clear Zone (WZCZ) applies during working and nonworking hours. The  
50 WZCZ applies only to temporary roadside objects introduced by the Contractor's operations  
51 and does not apply to preexisting conditions or permanent Work. Those work operations  
52 that are actively in progress shall be in accordance with adopted and approved Traffic  
53 Control Plans, and other contract requirements.

1  
2 During nonworking hours equipment or materials shall not be within the WZCZ unless they  
3 are protected by permanent guardrail or temporary concrete barrier. The use of temporary  
4 concrete barrier shall be permitted only if the Engineer approves the installation and  
5 location.

6  
7 During actual hours of work, unless protected as described above, only materials absolutely  
8 necessary to construction shall be within the WZCZ and only construction vehicles  
9 absolutely necessary to construction shall be allowed within the WZCZ or allowed to stop  
10 or park on the shoulder of the roadway.

11  
12 The Contractor's nonessential vehicles and employees private vehicles shall not be  
13 permitted to park within the WZCZ at any time unless protected as described above.

14  
15 Deviation from the above requirements shall not occur unless the Contractor has requested  
16 the deviation in writing and the Engineer has provided written approval.

17  
18 Minimum WZCZ distances are measured from the edge of traveled way and will be  
19 determined as follows:

26 **1-08.0 Preliminary Matters**

27 (May 25, 2006 APWA GSP)

28 Add the following new section:

29  
30 **1-08.0(1) Preconstruction Conference**

31 (October 10, 2008 APWA GSP)

32  
33 Prior to the Contractor beginning the work, a preconstruction conference will be held between the  
34 Contractor, the Engineer and such other interested parties as may be invited. The purpose of the  
35 preconstruction conference will be:

- 36 1. To review the initial progress schedule;  
37 2. To establish a working understanding among the various parties associated or affected by the  
38 work;  
39 3. To establish and review procedures for progress payment, notifications, approvals, submittals,  
40 etc.  
41 4. To establish normal working hours for the work;  
42 5. To review safety standards and traffic control; and  
43 6. To discuss such other related items as may be pertinent to the work.



1  
2 The Contractor shall prepare and submit at the preconstruction conference the following:

- 3 1. A breakdown of all lump sum items;
- 4 2. A preliminary schedule of working drawing submittals; and
- 5 3. A list of material sources for approval if applicable.

6  
7 Add the following new section:

8  
9 **1-08.0(2) Hours of Work**  
10 *(December 8, 2014 APWA GSP)*

11  
12 Except in the case of emergency or unless otherwise approved by the Engineer, the normal working  
13 hours for the Contract shall be any consecutive 8-hour period between 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.  
14 Monday through Friday, exclusive of a lunch break. If the Contractor desires different than the  
15 normal working hours stated above, the request must be submitted in writing prior to the  
16 preconstruction conference, subject to the provisions below. The working hours for the Contract  
17 shall be established at or prior to the preconstruction conference.  
18

19 All working hours and days are also subject to local permit and ordinance conditions (such as noise  
20 ordinances).  
21

22 If the Contractor wishes to deviate from the established working hours, the Contractor shall submit a  
23 written request to the Engineer for consideration. This request shall state what hours are being  
24 requested, and why. Requests shall be submitted for review no later than 3 working days prior to the  
25 day(s) the Contractor is requesting to change the hours.  
26

27 If the Contracting Agency approves such a deviation, such approval may be subject to certain other  
28 conditions, which will be detailed in writing. For example:

- 29 1. On non-Federal aid projects, requiring the Contractor to reimburse the Contracting Agency  
30 for the costs in excess of straight-time costs for Contracting Agency representatives who  
31 worked during such times. (The Engineer may require designated representatives to be  
32 present during the work. Representatives who may be deemed necessary by the Engineer  
33 include, but are not limited to: survey crews; personnel from the Contracting Agency's  
34 material testing lab; inspectors; and other Contracting Agency employees or third party  
35 consultants when, in the opinion of the Engineer, such work necessitates their presence.)
- 36 2. Considering the work performed on Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays as working days with  
37 regard to the contract time.
- 38 3. Considering multiple work shifts as multiple working days with respect to contract time even  
39 though the multiple shifts occur in a single 24-hour period.
- 40 4. If a 4-10 work schedule is requested and approved the non working day for the week will be  
41 charged as a working day.
- 42 5. If Davis Bacon wage rates apply to this Contract, all requirements must be met and recorded  
43 properly on certified payroll  
44

45 **1-08.1 Subcontracting**  
46 *(December 19, 2019 APWA GSP, Option A)*

47  
48 Prior to any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor beginning work, the Contractor shall submit to the  
49 Engineer a certification (WSDOT Form 420-004) that a written agreement between the Contractor and  
50 the subcontractor or between the subcontractor and any lower tier subcontractor has been executed.

1 This certification shall also guarantee that these subcontract agreements include all the documents  
2 required by the Special Provision Federal Agency Inspection.

3  
4 A Subcontractor or lower tier Subcontractor will not be permitted to perform any work under the contract  
5 until the following documents have been completed and submitted to the Engineer:

- 6 1. Request to Sublet Work (WSDOT Form 421-012), and
- 7 2. Contractor and Subcontractor or Lower Tier Subcontractor Certification for Federal-aid Projects  
8 (WSDOT Form 420-004).

9  
10  
11 The Contractor shall submit to the Engineer a completed Monthly Retainage Report (WSDOT Form  
12 272-065) within 15 calendar days after receipt of every monthly progress payment until every  
13 Subcontractor and lower tier Subcontractor's retainage has been released.

14  
15 The ninth paragraph, beginning with "On all projects, ..." is revised to read:

16  
17 The Contractor shall certify to the actual amount received from the Contracting Agency and amounts  
18 paid to all firms that were used as Subcontractors, lower tier subcontractors, manufacturers, regular  
19 dealers, or service providers on the Contract. This includes all Disadvantaged, Minority, Small,  
20 Veteran or Women's Business Enterprise firms. This Certification shall be submitted to the Engineer  
21 on a monthly basis each month between Execution of the Contract and Physical Completion of the  
22 Contract using the application available at: <https://wsdot.diversitycompliance.com>. A monthly report  
23 shall be submitted for every month between Execution of the Contract and Physical Completion  
24 regardless of whether payments were made or work occurred.

25  
26 **1-08.3(2)A Type A Progress Schedule**  
27 *(March 13, 2012 APWA GSP)*

28  
29 Revise this section to read:

30  
31 The Contractor shall submit ~~\$\$\$~~ 3 ~~\$\$\$~~ copies of a Type A Progress Schedule no later than at the  
32 preconstruction conference, or some other mutually agreed upon submittal time. The schedule may

**Washington State Department of Labor and Industries  
Policy Statement  
(Regarding the Production of "Standard" or "Non-standard" Items)**

Below is the department's (State L&I's) list of criteria to be used in determining whether a prefabricated item is "standard" or "non-standard". For items not appearing on WSDOT's predetermined list, these criteria shall be used by the Contractor (and the Contractor's subcontractors, agents to subcontractors, suppliers, manufacturers, and fabricators) to determine coverage under RCW 39.12. The production, in the State of Washington, of non-standard items is covered by RCW 39.12, and the production of standard items is not. The production of any item outside the State of Washington is not covered by RCW 39.12.

1. Is the item fabricated for a public works project? If not, it is not subject to RCW 39.12. If it is, go to question 2.
2. Is the item fabricated on the public works jobsite? If it is, the work is covered under RCW 39.12. If not, go to question 3.
3. Is the item fabricated in an assembly/fabrication plant set up for, and dedicated primarily to, the public works project? If it is, the work is covered by RCW 39.12. If not, go to question 4.
4. Does the item require any assembly, cutting, modification or other fabrication by the supplier? If not, the work is not covered by RCW 39.12. If yes, go to question 5.
5. Is the prefabricated item intended for the public works project typically an inventory item which could reasonably be sold on the general market? If not, the work is covered by RCW 39.12. If yes, go to question 6.
6. Does the specific prefabricated item, generally defined as standard, have any unusual characteristics such as shape, type of material, strength requirements, finish, etc? If yes, the work is covered under RCW 39.12.

Any firm with questions regarding the policy, WSDOT's Predetermined List, or for determinations of covered and non-covered workers shall be directed to State L&I at (360) 902-5330.

Prefabricated items specifically produced for public works projects that are prefabricated in a county other than the county wherein the public works project is to be completed, the wage for the offsite prefabrication shall be the applicable prevailing wage for the county in which the actual prefabrication takes place.

It is the manufacturer of the prefabricated product to verify that the correct county wage rates are applied to work they perform.

(The definition of "locality" in RCW [39.12.010](#)(2) contains the phrase "wherein the physical work is being performed." The department interprets this phrase to mean the actual work site.

## **WSDOT's List of State Occupations not applicable to Heavy and Highway Construction Projects**

This project is subject to the state hourly minimum rates for wages and fringe benefits in the contract provisions, as provided by the state Department of Labor and Industries.

The following list of occupations, is comprised of those occupations that are not normally used in the construction of heavy and highway projects.

When considering job classifications for use and / or payment when bidding on, or building heavy and highway construction projects for, or administered by WSDOT, these Occupations will be excepted from the included "Washington State Prevailing Wage Rates For Public Work Contracts" documents.

**(Regarding Production and Delivery of Gravel, Concrete, Asphalt, etc.)**

**WAC 296-127-018 Agency filings affecting this section**

**Coverage and exemptions of workers involved in the production and delivery of gravel, concrete, asphalt, or similar materials.**

(1) The materials covered under this section include but are not limited to: Sand, gravel, crushed rock, concrete, asphalt, or other similar materials.

(2) All workers, regardless of by whom employed, are subject to the provisions of chapter 39.12 RCW when they perform any or all of the following functions:

(a) They deliver or discharge any of the above-listed materials to a public works project site:

(i) At one or more point(s) directly upon the location where the material will be incorporated into the project; or

(ii) At multiple points at the project; or

(iii) Adjacent to the location and coordinated with the incorporation of those materials.

(b) They wait at or near a public works project site to perform any tasks subject to this section of the rule.

(c) They remove any materials from a public works construction site pursuant to contract requirements or specifications (e.g., excavated materials, materials from demolished structures, clean-up materials, etc.).

(d) They work in a materials production facility (e.g., batch plant, borrow pit, rock quarry, etc.) which is established for a public works project for the specific, but not necessarily exclusive, purpose of supplying materials for the project.

(e) They deliver concrete to a public works site regardless of the method of incorporation.

(f) They assist or participate in the incorporation of any materials into the public works project.

(3) All travel time that relates to the work covered under subsection (2) of this section requires the payment of prevailing wages. Travel time includes time spent waiting to load, loading, transporting, waiting to unload, and delivering materials. Travel time would include all time spent in travel in support of a public works project whether the vehicle is empty or full. For example, travel time spent returning to a supply source to obtain another load of material for use on a public works site or returning to the public works site to obtain another load of excavated material is time spent in travel that is subject to prevailing wage. Travel to a supply source, including travel from a public works site, to obtain materials for use on a private project would not be travel subject to the prevailing wage.

(4) Workers are not subject to the provisions of chapter 39.12 RCW when they deliver materials to a stockpile.

(a) A "stockpile" is defined as materials delivered to a pile located away from the site of incorporation such that the stockpiled materials must be physically moved from the stockpile and transported to another location on the project site in order to be incorporated into the project.

(b) A stockpile does not include any of the functions described in subsection (2)(a) through (f) of this section; nor does a stockpile include materials delivered or distributed to multiple locations upon the project site; nor does a stockpile include materials dumped at the place of incorporation, or adjacent to the location and coordinated with the incorporation.

(5) The applicable prevailing wage rate shall be determined by the locality in which the work is performed. Workers subject to subsection (2)(d) of this section, who produce such materials at an off-site facility shall be paid the applicable prevailing wage rates for the county in which the off-site facility is located. Workers subject to subsection (2) of this section, who deliver such materials to a public works project site shall be paid the applicable prevailing wage rates for the county in which the public works project is located.

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**Overtime Codes**

**Overtime calculations** are based on the hourly rate actually paid to the worker. On public works projects, the hourly rate must be not less than the prevailing rate of wage minus the hourly rate of the cost of fringe benefits actually provided for the worker.

1. ALL HOURS WORKED IN EXCESS OF EIGHT (8) HOURS PER DAY OR FORTY (40) HOURS PER WEEK SHALL BE PAID AT ONE AND ONE-HALF TIMES THE HOURLY RATE OF WAGE.
  - B. All hours worked on Saturdays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
  - C. The first two (2) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and the first ten (10) hours on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All other overtime hours and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
  - D. The first two (2) hours before or after a five-eight (8) hour workweek day or a four-ten (10) hour workweek day and the first eight (8) hours worked the next day after either workweek shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All additional hours worked and all worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
  - E. The first two (2) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and the first eight (8) hours on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All other hours worked Monday through Saturday, and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
  - F. The first two (2) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and the first ten (10) hours on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All other overtime hours worked, except Labor Day, shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Labor Day shall be paid at three times the hourly rate of wage.
  - G. The first ten (10) hours worked on Saturdays and the first ten (10) hours worked on a fifth calendar weekday in a four-ten hour schedule, shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked in excess of ten (10) hours per day Monday through Saturday and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
  - H. All hours worked on Saturdays (except makeup days if work is lost due to inclement weather conditions or equipment breakdown) shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked Monday through Saturday over twelve (12) hours and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
  - I. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall also be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
  - J. The first two (2) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and the first ten (10) hours on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked over ten (10) hours Monday through Saturday, Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
  - K. All hours worked on Saturdays and Sundays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
  - M. All hours worked on Saturdays (except makeup days if work is lost due to inclement weather conditions) shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
  - N. All hours worked on Saturdays (except makeup days) shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

1. O. The first ten (10) hours worked on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Sundays, holidays and after twelve (12) hours, Monday through Friday and after ten (10) hours on Saturday shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
- P. All hours worked on Saturdays (except makeup days if circumstances warrant) and Sundays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
- Q. The first two (2) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and up to ten (10) hours worked on Saturdays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked in excess of ten (10) hours per day Monday through Saturday and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays (except Christmas day) shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Christmas day shall be paid at two and one-half times the hourly rate of wage.

All hours worked on holidays and all other overtime hours worked, except Labor Day, shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Labor Day shall be paid at three times the hourly rate of wage.
- U. All hours worked on Saturdays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays (except Labor Day) shall be paid at two times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Labor Day shall be paid at three times the hourly rate of wage.
- V. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays (except Thanksgiving Day and Christmas day) shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Thanksgiving Day and Christmas day shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
- W. All hours worked on Saturdays and Sundays (except make-up days due to conditions beyond the control of the employer) shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
- X. The first four (4) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and the first twelve (12) hours on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked over twelve (12) hours Monday through Saturday, Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. When holiday falls on Saturday or Sunday, the day before Saturday, Friday, and the day after Sunday, Monday, shall be considered the holiday and all work performed shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
- Y. All hours worked outside the hours of 5:00 am and 5:00 pm (or such other hours as may be agreed upon by any employer and the employee) and all hours worked in excess of eight (8) hours per day (10 hours per day for a 4 x 10 workweek) and on Saturdays and holidays (except labor day) shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. (except for employees who are absent from work without prior approval on a scheduled workday during the workweek shall be paid at the straight-time rate until they have worked 8 hours in a day (10 in a 4 x 10 workweek) or 40 hours during that workweek.) All hours worked Monday through Saturday over twelve (12) hours and all hours worked on Sundays and Labor Day shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
- Z. All hours worked on Saturdays and Sundays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on holidays shall be paid the straight time rate of pay in addition to holiday pay.

2. ALL HOURS WORKED IN EXCESS OF EIGHT (8) HOURS PER DAY OR FORTY (40) HOURS PER WEEK SHALL BE PAID AT ONE AND ONE-HALF TIMES THE HOURLY RATE OF WAGE.
- B. All hours worked on holidays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage.

- A. Work performed in excess of eight (8) hours of straight time per day, or ten (10) hours of straight time per day when four ten (10) hour shifts are established, or forty (40) hours of straight time per week, Monday through Friday, or outside the normal shift, and all work on Saturdays shall be paid at time and one-half the straight time rate. Hours worked over twelve hours (12) in a single shift and all work performed after 6:00 pm Saturday to 6:00 am Monday and holidays shall be paid at double the straight time rate of pay. Any shift starting between the hours of 6:00 pm and midnight shall receive an additional one dollar (\$1.00) per hour for all hours worked that shift. The employer shall have the sole discretion to assign overtime work to employees. Primary consideration for overtime work shall be given to employees regularly assigned to the work to be performed on overtime situations. After an employee has worked eight (8) hours at an applicable overtime rate, all additional hours shall be at the applicable overtime rate until such time as the employee has had a break of eight (8) hours or more.
  - C. Work performed in excess of eight (8) hours of straight time per day, or ten (10) hours of straight time per day when four ten (10) hour shifts are established, or forty (40) hours of straight time per week, Monday through Friday, or outside the normal shift, and all work on Saturdays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All work performed after 6:00 pm Saturday to 5:00 am Monday and Holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. After an employee has worked eight (8) hours at an applicable overtime rate, all additional hours shall be at the applicable overtime rate until such time as the employee has had a break of eight (8) hours or more.

3. E. All hours worked Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. Each week, once 40 hours of straight time work is achieved, then any hours worked over 10 hours per day Monday through Saturday shall be paid at double the hourly wage rate.
- F. All hours worked on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Sunday shall be paid at two times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on paid holidays shall be paid at two and one-half times the hourly rate of wage including holiday pay.
- H. All work performed on Sundays between March 16th and October 14th and all Holidays shall be compensated for at two (2) times the regular rate of pay. Work performed on Sundays between October 15th and March 15th shall be compensated at one and one half (1-1/2) times the regular rate of pay.

All work performed after 6:00 pm Saturday to 5:00 am Monday and Holidays, and all hours worked in excess of twelve (12) hours in a single shift shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

After an employee has worked eight (8) hours at an applicable overtime rate, all additional hours shall be at the applicable overtime rate until such time as the employee has had a break of eight (8) hours or more. When an employee returns to work without at least eight (8) hours time off since their previous shift, all such time shall be a continuation of shift and paid at the applicable overtime rate until he/she shall have the eight (8) hours rest period.

4. ALL HOURS WORKED IN EXCESS OF EIGHT (8) HOURS PER DAY OR FORTY (40) HOURS PER WEEK SHALL BE PAID AT ONE AND ONE-HALF TIMES THE HOURLY RATE OF WAGE.
- A. All hours worked in excess of eight (8) hours per day or forty (40) hours per week shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
- B. All hours worked over twelve (12) hours per day and all hours worked on holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
- C. On Monday through Friday, the first four (4) hours of overtime after eight (8) hours of straight time work shall be paid at one and one half (1-1/2) times the straight time rate of pay, unless a four (4) day ten (10) hour workweek has been established. On a four (4) day ten (10) hour workweek scheduled Monday through Thursday, or Tuesday through Friday, the first two (2) hours of overtime after ten (10) hours of straight time work shall be paid at one and one half (1-1/2) times the straight time rate of pay. On Saturday, the first twelve (12) hours of work shall be paid at one and one half (1-1/2) times the straight time rate of pay, except that if the job is down on Monday through Friday due to weather conditions or other conditions outside the control of the employer, the first ten (10) hours on Saturday may be worked at the straight time rate of pay. All hours worked over twelve (12) hours in a day and all hours worked on Sunday and Holidays shall be paid at two (2) times the straight time rate of pay.

4. D. All hours worked in excess of eight (8) hours per day or forty (40) hours per week shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Saturday, Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of pay. Rates include all members of the assigned crew.

EXCEPTION:

On all multipole structures and steel transmission lines, switching stations, regulating, capacitor stations, generating plants, industrial plants, associated installations and substations, except those substations whose primary function is to feed a distribution system, will be paid overtime under the following rates:

The first two (2) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday of overtime on a regular workday, shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours in excess of ten (10) hours will be at two (2) times the hourly rate of wage. The first eight (8) hours worked on Saturday will be paid at one and one-half (1-1/2) times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked in excess of eight (8) hours on Saturday, and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays will be at the double the hourly rate of wage.

All overtime eligible hours performed on the above described work that is energized, shall be paid at the double the hourly rate of wage.

- E. The first two (2) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and the first eight (8) hours on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All other hours worked Monday through Saturday, and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

On a four-day, ten-hour weekly schedule, either Monday thru Thursday or Tuesday thru Friday schedule, all hours worked after ten shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. The Monday or Friday not utilized in the normal four-day, ten hour work week, and Saturday shall be paid at one and one half (1½) times the regular shift rate for the first eight (8) hours. All other hours worked Monday through Saturday, and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

- F. All hours worked between the hours of 6:00 pm and 6:00 am, Monday through Saturday, shall be paid at a premium rate of 20% over the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Sundays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

- G. All hours worked on Saturdays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked Monday through Saturday over twelve (12) hours and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

- H. The first two (2) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and the first eight (8) hours on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All other overtime hours worked, except Labor Day, and all hours on Sunday shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Labor Day shall be paid at three times the hourly rate of wage.

- I. The First eight (8) hours worked on Saturdays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked in excess of eight (8) per day on Saturdays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

- J. The first eight (8) hours worked on a Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked in excess of eight (8) hours on a Saturday shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked over twelve (12) in a day, and all hours worked on Sundays and Holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

- K. All hours worked on a Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage, so long as Saturday is the sixth consecutive day worked. All hours worked over twelve (12) in a day Monday through Saturday, and all hours worked on Sundays and Holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

4. L. The first twelve (12) hours worked on a Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on a Saturday in excess of twelve (12) hours shall be paid at double the hourly rate of pay. All hours worked over twelve (12) in a day Monday through Friday, and all hours worked on Sundays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on a holiday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage, except that all hours worked on Labor Day shall be paid at double the hourly rate of pay.

All hours worked in excess of ten (10) hours per day shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. For work on Saturday which is scheduled prior to the end of shift on Friday, the first six (6) hours work shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage, and all hours over (6) shall be paid double the hourly rate of wage. For work on Saturday which was assigned following the close of shift on Friday, all work shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
- U. The first four (4) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and the first twelve (12) hours on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. (Except on makeup days if work is lost due to inclement weather, then the first eight (8) hours on Saturday may be paid the regular rate.) All hours worked over twelve (12) hours Monday through Saturday, and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

4. V. Work performed in excess of ten (10) hours of straight time per day when four ten (10) hour shifts are established or outside the normal shift (5 am to 6pm), and all work on Saturdays, except for make-up days shall be paid at time and one-half (1 ½) the straight time rate.

In the event the job is down due to weather conditions, then Saturday may, be worked as a voluntary make-up day at the straight time rate. However, Saturday shall not be utilized as a make-up day when a holiday falls on Friday. All work performed on Sundays and holidays and work in excess of twelve (12) hours per day shall be paid at double (2x) the straight time rate of pay.

When an employee returns to work without at least eight (8) hours time off since their previous shift, all such time shall be a continuation of shift and paid at the applicable overtime rate until such time as the employee has had a break of eight (8) hours.

- X. All hours worked on Saturdays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. Work performed outside the normal shift of 6 am to 6pm shall be paid at one and one-half the straight time rate, (except for special shifts or three shift operations). All work performed on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. Shifts may be established when considered necessary by the Employer.

The Employer may establish shifts consisting of eight (8) or ten (10) hours of work (subject to WAC 296-127-022), that shall constitute a normal forty (40) hour work week. The Employer can change from a 5-eight to a 4-ten hour schedule or back to the other. All hours of work on these shifts shall be paid for at the straight time hourly rate. Work performed in excess of eight hours (or ten hours per day (subject to WAC 296-127-022) shall be paid at one and one-half the straight time rate.

When due to conditions beyond the control of the Employer, or when contract specifications require that work can only be performed outside the regular day shift, then by mutual agreement a special shift may be worked at the straight time rate, eight (8) hours work for eight (8) hours pay. The starting time shall be arranged to fit such conditions of work.

When an employee returns to work without at a break of eight (8) hours since their previous shift, all such time shall be a continuation of shift and paid at the applicable overtime rate until such time as the employee has had a break of eight (8) hours.

Certified Crane Operator Premium: Crane operators requiring certifications shall be paid \$0.50 per hour above their classification rate.

Footnote A - Anyone working on a HAZMAT job, where HAZMAT certification is required, shall be compensated as a premium, in addition to the classification working in as follows:

LEVEL A-B: - \$1.00 PER HOUR (Uses supplied air in conjunction with a chemical splash suit or fully encapsulated suit with a self-contained breathing apparatus.

Employees shall be paid Hazmat pay in increments of four(4) and eight(8) hours.

NOTE:

Trucks Pulling Equipment Trailers: shall receive \$.15/hour over applicable truck rate

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WELDERS - Receive rate prescribed for craft performing operation to which welding is incidental.

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Note: Executive Order (EO) 13706, Establishing Paid Sick Leave for Federal Contractors applies to all contracts subject to the Davis-Bacon Act for which the contract is awarded (and any solicitation was issued) on or after January 1, 2017. If this contract is covered by the EO, the contractor must provide employees with 1 hour of paid sick leave for every 30 hours they work, up to 56 hours of paid sick leave each year. Employees must be permitted to use paid sick leave for their own illness, injury or other health-related needs, including preventive care; to assist a family member (or person who is like family to the employee) who is ill, injured, or has other health-related needs, including preventive care; or for reasons resulting from, or to assist a family member (or person who is like family to the employee) who is a victim of, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking. Unlisted classifications needed for work not included within the scope of the classifications listed may be added after award only as provided in the labor standards contract clauses (29CFR 5.5 (a) (1) (ii)).

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The body of each wage determination lists the classification and wage rates that have been found to be prevailing for the cited type(s) of construction in the area covered by the wage determination. The classifications are listed in alphabetical order of ""identifiers"" that indicate whether the particular rate is a union rate (current union negotiated rate for local), a survey rate (weighted average rate) or a union average rate (weighted union average rate).

#### Union Rate Identifiers

A four letter classification abbreviation identifier enclosed in dotted lines beginning with characters other than ""SU"" or ""UAVG"" denotes that the union classification and rate were prevailing for that classification in the survey. Example: PLUM0198-005 07/01/2014. PLUM is an abbreviation identifier of the union which prevailed in the survey for this classification, which in this example would be Plumbers. 0198 indicates the local union number or district council number where applicable, i.e., Plumbers Local 0198. The next number, 005 in the example, is an internal number used in processing the wage determination. 07/01/2014 is the effective date of the most current negotiated rate, which in this example is July 1, 2014.

Union prevailing wage rates are updated to reflect all rate changes in the collective bargaining agreement (CBA) governing this classification and rate.

#### Survey Rate Identifiers

Classifications listed under the ""SU"" identifier indicate that no one rate prevailed for this classification in the survey and the published rate is derived by computing a weighted average rate based on all the rates reported in the survey for that classification. As this weighted average rate includes all rates reported in the survey, it may include both union and non-union rates. Example: SULA2012-007 5/13/2014. SU indicates the rates are survey rates based on a weighted average calculation of rates and are not majority rates. LA indicates the State of Louisiana. 2012 is the year of survey on which these classifications and rates are based. The next number, 007 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. 5/13/2014 indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

Survey wage rates are not updated and remain in effect until a new survey is conducted.

## Union Average Rate Identifiers

Classification(s) listed under the UAVG identifier indicate that no single majority rate prevailed for those classifications; however, 100% of the data reported for the classifications was union data. EXAMPLE: UAVG-OH-0010 08/29/2014. UAVG indicates that the rate is a weighted union average rate. OH indicates the state. The next number, 0010 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. 08/29/2014 indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

A UAVG rate will be updated once a year, usually in January of each year, to reflect a weighted average of the current negotiated/CBA rate of the union locals from which the rate is based.

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## WAGE DETERMINATION APPEALS PROCESS

1.) Has there been an initial decision in the matter? This can be:

- \* an existing published wage determination
- \* a survey underlying a wage determination
- \* a Wage and Hour Division letter setting forth a position on a wage determination matter
- \* a conformance (additional classification and rate) ruling

On survey related matters, initial contact, including requests for summaries of surveys, should be with the Wage and Hour Regional Office for the area in which the survey was conducted because those Regional Offices have responsibility for the Davis-Bacon survey program. If the response from this initial contact is not satisfactory, then the process described in 2.) and 3.) should be followed.

With regard to any other matter not yet ripe for the formal process described here, initial contact should be with the Branch of Construction Wage Determinations. Write to:

A. Employment and Materials Preference for Appalachian Development Highway System or Appalachian Local Access Road Contracts (included in Appalachian contracts only)

**I. GENERAL**

1. Form FHWA-1273 must be physically incorporated in each construction contract funded under Title 23 (excluding emergency contracts solely intended for debris removal). The contractor (or subcontractor) must insert this form in each subcontract and further require its inclusion in all lower tier subcontracts (excluding purchase orders, rental agreements and other agreements for supplies or services).

The applicable requirements of Form FHWA-1273 are incorporated by reference for work done under any purchase order, rental agreement or agreement for other services. The prime contractor shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor, lower-tier subcontractor or service provider.

Form FHWA-1273 must be included in all Federal-aid design-build contracts, in all subcontracts and in lower tier subcontracts (excluding subcontracts for design services, purchase orders, rental agreements and other agreements for supplies or services). The design-builder shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor, lower-tier subcontractor or service provider.

Contracting agencies may reference Form FHWA-1273 in bid proposal or request for proposal documents, however, the Form FHWA-1273 must be physically incorporated (not referenced) in all contracts, subcontracts and lower-tier subcontracts (excluding purchase orders, rental agreements and other agreements for supplies or services related to a construction contract).

2. Subject to the applicability criteria noted in the following sections, these contract provisions shall apply to all work performed on the contract by the contractor's own organization and with

the assistance of workers under the contractor's immediate superintendence and to all work performed on the contract by piecework, station work, or by subcontract.

3. A breach of any of the stipulations contained in these Required Contract Provisions may be sufficient grounds for withholding of progress payments, withholding of final payment, termination of the contract, suspension / debarment or any other action determined to be appropriate by the contracting agency and FHWA.

4. Selection of Labor: During the performance of this contract, the contractor shall not use convict labor for any purpose within the limits of a construction project on a Federal-aid highway unless it is labor performed by convicts who are on parole, supervised release, or probation. The term Federal-aid highway does not include roadways functionally classified as local roads or rural minor collectors.

## II. NONDISCRIMINATION

The provisions of this section related to 23 CFR Part 230 are applicable to all Federal-aid construction contracts and to all related construction subcontracts of \$10,000 or more. The provisions of 23 CFR Part 230 are not applicable to material supply, engineering, or architectural service contracts.

In addition, the contractor and all subcontractors must comply with the following policies: Executive Order 11246, 41 CFR 60, 29 CFR 1625-1627, Title 23 USC Section 140, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended (29 USC 794), Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, and related regulations including 49 CFR Parts 21, 26 and 27; and 23 CFR Parts 200, 230, and 633.

The contractor and all subcontractors must comply with: the requirements of the Equal Opportunity Clause in 41 CFR 60-1.4(b) and, for all construction contracts exceeding \$10,000, the Standard Federal Equal Employment Opportunity Construction Contract Specifications in 41 CFR 60-4.3.

Note: The U.S. Department of Labor has exclusive authority to determine compliance with Executive Order 11246 and the policies of the Secretary of Labor including 41 CFR 60, and 29 CFR 1625-1627. The contracting agency and the FHWA have the authority and the responsibility to ensure compliance with Title 23 USC Section 140, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended (29 USC 794), and Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, and related regulations including 49 CFR Parts 21, 26 and 27; and 23 CFR Parts 200, 230, and 633.

The following provision is adopted from 23 CFR 230, Appendix A, with appropriate revisions to conform to the U.S. Department of Labor (US DOL) and FHWA requirements.

**1. Equal Employment Opportunity:** Equal employment opportunity (EEO) requirements not to discriminate and to take affirmative action to assure equal opportunity as set forth under laws, executive orders, rules, regulations (28 CFR 35, 29 CFR 1630, 29 CFR 1625-1627, 41 CFR 60 and 49 CFR 27) and orders of the Secretary of Labor as modified by the provisions prescribed herein, and imposed pursuant to 23 U.S.C. 140 shall constitute the EEO and specific affirmative action standards for the contractor's project activities under this contract. The provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.) set forth under 28 CFR 35 and 29 CFR 1630 are incorporated by reference in this contract. In the execution of this

contract, the contractor agrees to comply with the following minimum specific requirement activities of EEO:

a. The contractor will work with the contracting agency and the Federal Government to ensure that it has made every good faith effort to provide equal opportunity with respect to all of its terms and conditions of employment and in their review of activities under the contract.

b. The contractor will accept as its operating policy the following statement:

"It is the policy of this Company to assure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, religion, sex, color, national origin, age or disability. Such action shall include: employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship, pre-apprenticeship, and/or on-the-job training."

**2. EEO Officer:** The contractor will designate and make known to the contracting officers an EEO Officer who will have the responsibility for and must be capable of effectively administering and promoting an active EEO program and who must be assigned adequate authority and responsibility to do so.

**3. Dissemination of Policy:** All members of the contractor's staff who are authorized to hire, supervise, promote, and discharge employees, or who recommend such action, or who are substantially involved in such action, will be made fully cognizant of, and will implement, the contractor's EEO policy and contractual responsibilities to provide EEO in each grade and classification of employment. To ensure that the above agreement will be met, the following actions will be taken as a minimum:

a. Periodic meetings of supervisory and personnel office employees will be conducted before the start of work and then not less often than once every six months, at which time the contractor's EEO policy and its implementation will be reviewed and explained. The meetings will be conducted by the EEO Officer.

b. All new supervisory or personnel office employees will be given a thorough indoctrination by the EEO Officer, covering all major aspects of the contractor's EEO obligations within thirty days following their reporting for duty with the contractor.

c. All personnel who are engaged in direct recruitment for the project will be instructed by the EEO Officer in the contractor's procedures for locating and hiring minorities and women.

d. Notices and posters setting forth the contractor's EEO policy will be placed in areas readily accessible to employees, applicants for employment and potential employees.

e. The contractor's EEO policy and the procedures to implement such policy will be brought to the attention of employees by means of meetings, employee handbooks, or other appropriate means.

**4. Recruitment:** When advertising for employees, the contractor will include in all advertisements for employees the notation: "An Equal Opportunity Employer." All such advertisements will be placed in publications having a large circulation among minorities and women in the area from which the project work force would normally be derived.

a. The contractor will, unless precluded by a valid bargaining agreement, conduct systematic and direct recruitment through public and private employee referral sources likely to yield qualified minorities and women. To meet this requirement, the contractor will identify sources of potential minority group employees, and establish with such identified sources procedures whereby minority and women applicants may be referred to the contractor for employment consideration.

b. In the event the contractor has a valid bargaining agreement providing for exclusive hiring hall referrals, the contractor is expected to observe the provisions of that agreement to the extent that the system meets the contractor's compliance with EEO contract provisions. Where implementation of such an agreement has the effect of discriminating against minorities or women, or obligates the contractor to do the same, such implementation violates Federal nondiscrimination provisions.

c. The contractor will encourage its present employees to refer minorities and women as applicants for employment. Information and procedures with regard to referring such applicants will be discussed with employees.

**5. Personnel Actions:** Wages, working conditions, and employee benefits shall be established and administered, and personnel actions of every type, including hiring, upgrading, promotion, transfer, demotion, layoff, and termination, shall be taken without regard to race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age or disability. The following procedures shall be followed:

a. The contractor will conduct periodic inspections of project sites to insure that working conditions and employee facilities do not indicate discriminatory treatment of project site personnel.

b. The contractor will periodically evaluate the spread of wages paid within each classification to determine any evidence of discriminatory wage practices.

c. The contractor will periodically review selected personnel actions in depth to determine whether there is evidence of discrimination. Where evidence is found, the contractor will promptly take corrective action. If the review indicates that the discrimination may extend beyond the actions reviewed, such corrective action shall include all affected persons.

d. The contractor will promptly investigate all complaints of alleged discrimination made to the contractor in connection with its obligations under this contract, will attempt to resolve such complaints, and will take appropriate corrective action within a reasonable time. If the investigation indicates that the discrimination may affect persons other than the complainant, such corrective action shall include such other persons. Upon completion of each investigation, the contractor will inform every complainant of all of their avenues of appeal.

## **6. Training and Promotion:**

a. The contractor will assist in locating, qualifying, and increasing the skills of minorities and women who are applicants for employment or current employees. Such efforts should be aimed at developing full journey level status employees in the type of trade or job classification involved.

b. Consistent with the contractor's work force requirements and as permissible under Federal and State regulations, the contractor shall make full use of training programs, i.e., apprenticeship, and on-the-job training programs for the geographical area of contract performance. In the event a special provision for training is provided under this contract, this subparagraph will be superseded as indicated in the special provision. The contracting agency may reserve training positions for persons who receive welfare assistance in accordance with 23 U.S.C. 140(a).

c. The contractor will advise employees and applicants for employment of available training programs and entrance requirements for each.

d. The contractor will periodically review the training and promotion potential of employees who are minorities and women and will encourage eligible employees to apply for such training and promotion.

**7. Unions:** If the contractor relies in whole or in part upon unions as a source of employees, the contractor will use good faith efforts to obtain the cooperation of such unions to increase opportunities for minorities and women. Actions by the contractor, either directly or through a contractor's association acting as agent, will include the procedures set forth below:

a. The contractor will use good faith efforts to develop, in cooperation with the unions, joint training programs aimed toward qualifying more minorities and women for membership in the unions and increasing the skills of minorities and women so that they may qualify for higher paying employment.

b. The contractor will use good faith efforts to incorporate an EEO clause into each union agreement to the end that such union will be contractually bound to refer applicants without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age or disability.

c. The contractor is to obtain information as to the referral practices and policies of the labor union except that to the extent such information is within the exclusive possession of the labor union and such labor union refuses to furnish such information to the contractor, the contractor shall so certify to the contracting agency and shall set forth what efforts have been made to obtain such information.

d. In the event the union is unable to provide the contractor with a reasonable flow of referrals within the time limit set forth in the collective bargaining agreement, the contractor will, through independent recruitment efforts, fill the employment vacancies without regard to race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age or disability; making full efforts to obtain qualified and/or qualifiable minorities and women. The failure of a union to provide sufficient referrals (even though it is obligated to provide exclusive referrals under the terms of a collective bargaining agreement) does not relieve the contractor from the requirements of this paragraph. In the event the union referral practice prevents the contractor from meeting the obligations pursuant to Executive Order 11246, as amended, and these special provisions, such contractor shall immediately notify the contracting agency.

**8. Reasonable Accommodation for Applicants / Employees with Disabilities:** The contractor must be familiar with the requirements for and comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act and all rules and regulations established there under. Employers must provide reasonable accommodation in all employment activities unless to do so would cause an undue hardship.

**9. Selection of Subcontractors, Procurement of Materials and Leasing of Equipment:** The contractor shall not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age or disability in the selection and retention of subcontractors, including procurement of materials and leases of equipment. The contractor shall take all necessary and reasonable steps to ensure nondiscrimination in the administration of this contract.

a. The contractor shall notify all potential subcontractors and suppliers and lessors of their EEO obligations under this contract.

b. The contractor will use good faith efforts to ensure subcontractor compliance with their EEO obligations.

**10. Assurance Required by 49 CFR 26.13(b):**

a. The requirements of 49 CFR Part 26 and the State DOT's U.S. DOT-approved DBE program are incorporated by reference.

b. The contractor or subcontractor shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the performance of this contract. The contractor shall carry out applicable requirements of 49 CFR Part 26 in the award and administration of DOT-assisted contracts. Failure by the contractor to carry out these requirements is a material breach of this contract, which may result in the termination of this contract or such other remedy as the contracting agency deems appropriate.

**11. Records and Reports:** The contractor shall keep such records as necessary to document compliance with the EEO requirements. Such records shall be retained for a period of three years following the date of the final payment to the contractor for all contract work and shall be available at reasonable times and places for inspection by authorized representatives of the contracting agency and the FHWA.

a. The records kept by the contractor shall document the following:

(1) The number and work hours of minority and non-minority group members and women employed in each work classification on the project;

(2) The progress and efforts being made in cooperation with unions, when applicable, to increase employment opportunities for minorities and women; and

(3) The progress and efforts being made in locating, hiring, training, qualifying, and upgrading minorities and women;

b. The contractors and subcontractors will submit an annual report to the contracting agency each July for the duration of the project, indicating the number of minority, women, and non-minority group employees currently engaged in each work classification required by the contract work. This information is to be reported on [Form FHWA-1391](#). The staffing data should represent the project work force on board in all or any part of the last payroll period preceding the end of July. If on-the-job training is being required by special provision, the contractor will be required to collect and report training data. The employment data should reflect the work force on board during all or any part of the last payroll period preceding the end of July.

### **III. NONSEGREGATED FACILITIES**

This provision is applicable to all Federal-aid construction contracts and to all related construction subcontracts of \$10,000 or more.

The contractor must ensure that facilities provided for employees are provided in such a manner that segregation on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin cannot result. The contractor may neither require such segregated use by written or oral policies nor tolerate such use by employee custom. The contractor's obligation extends further to ensure that its employees are not assigned to perform their services at any location, under the contractor's control, where the facilities are segregated. The term "facilities" includes waiting rooms, work areas, restaurants and other eating areas, time clocks, restrooms, washrooms, locker rooms, and other storage or dressing areas, parking lots, drinking fountains, recreation or entertainment areas, transportation, and housing provided for employees. The contractor shall provide separate or single-user restrooms and necessary dressing or sleeping areas to assure privacy between sexes.

### **IV. DAVIS-BACON AND RELATED ACT PROVISIONS**

This section is applicable to all Federal-aid construction projects exceeding \$2,000 and to all related subcontracts and lower-tier subcontracts (regardless of subcontract size). The requirements apply to all projects located within the right-of-way of a roadway that is functionally classified as Federal-aid highway. This excludes roadways functionally classified as local roads or rural minor collectors, which are exempt. Contracting agencies may elect to apply these requirements to other projects.

The following provisions are from the U.S. Department of Labor regulations in 29 CFR 5.5 "Contract provisions and related matters" with minor revisions to conform to the FHWA-1273 format and FHWA program requirements.

#### **1. Minimum wages**

a. All laborers and mechanics employed or working upon the site of the work, will be paid unconditionally and not less often than once a week, and without subsequent deduction or rebate on any account (except such payroll deductions as are permitted by regulations issued by the Secretary of Labor under the Copeland Act (29 CFR part 3)), the full amount of wages and bona fide fringe benefits (or cash equivalents thereof) due at time of payment computed at rates not less than those contained in the wage determination of the Secretary of Labor which is attached hereto and made a part hereof, regardless of any contractual relationship which may be alleged to exist between the contractor and such laborers and mechanics.

Contributions made or costs reasonably anticipated for bona fide fringe benefits under section 1(b)(2) of the Davis-Bacon Act on behalf of laborers or mechanics are considered wages paid to such laborers or mechanics, subject to the provisions of paragraph 1.d. of this section; also, regular contributions made or costs incurred for more than a weekly period (but not less often than quarterly) under plans, funds, or programs which cover the particular weekly period, are deemed to be constructively made or incurred during such weekly period. Such laborers and



mechanics shall be paid the appropriate wage rate and fringe benefits on the wage determination for the classification of work actually performed, without regard to skill, except as provided in 29 CFR 5.5(a)(4). Laborers or mechanics performing work in more than one classification may be compensated at the rate specified for each classification for the time actually worked therein: Provided, That the employer's payroll records accurately set forth the time spent in each classification in which work is performed. The wage determination (including any additional classification and wage rates conformed under paragraph 1.b. of this section) and the Davis-Bacon poster (WH-1321) shall be posted at all times by the contractor and its subcontractors at the site of the work in a prominent and accessible place where it can be easily seen by the workers.

b. (1) The contracting officer shall require that any class of laborers or mechanics, including helpers, which is not listed in the wage determination and which is to be employed under the contract shall be classified in conformance with the wage determination. The contracting officer shall approve an additional classification and wage rate and fringe benefits therefore only when the following criteria have been met:

(i) The work to be performed by the classification requested is not performed by a classification in the wage determination; and

(ii) The classification is utilized in the area by the construction industry; and

(iii) The proposed wage rate, including any bona fide fringe benefits, bears a reasonable relationship to the wage rates contained in the wage determination.

(2) If the contractor and the laborers and mechanics to be employed in the classification (if known), or their representatives, and the contracting officer agree on the classification and wage rate (including the amount designated for fringe benefits where appropriate), a report of the action taken shall be sent by the contracting officer to the Administrator of the Wage and Hour Division, Employment Standards Administration, U.S. Department of Labor, Washington, DC 20210. The Administrator, or an authorized representative, will approve, modify, or disapprove every additional classification action within 30 days of receipt and so advise the contracting officer or will notify the contracting officer within the 30-day period that additional time is necessary.

(3) In the event the contractor, the laborers or mechanics to be employed in the classification or their representatives, and the contracting officer do not agree on the proposed classification and wage rate (including the amount designated for fringe benefits, where appropriate), the contracting officer shall refer the questions, including the views of all interested parties and the recommendation of the contracting officer, to the Wage and Hour Administrator for determination. The Wage and Hour Administrator, or an authorized representative, will issue a determination within 30 days of receipt and so advise the contracting officer or will notify the contracting officer within the 30-day period that additional time is necessary.

(4) The wage rate (including fringe benefits where appropriate) determined pursuant to paragraphs 1.b.(2) or 1.b.(3) of this section, shall be paid to all workers performing work in the classification under this contract from the first day on which work is performed in the classification.

c. Whenever the minimum wage rate prescribed in the contract for a class of laborers or mechanics includes a fringe benefit which is not expressed as an hourly rate, the contractor shall either pay the benefit as stated in the wage determination or shall pay another bona fide fringe benefit or an hourly cash equivalent thereof.

d. If the contractor does not make payments to a trustee or other third person, the contractor may consider as part of the wages of any laborer or mechanic the amount of any costs reasonably anticipated in providing bona fide fringe benefits under a plan or program, Provided, That the Secretary of Labor has found, upon the written request of the contractor, that the applicable standards of the Davis-Bacon Act have been met. The Secretary of Labor may require the contractor to set aside in a separate account assets for the meeting of obligations under the plan or program.

## **2. Withholding**

The contracting agency shall upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor, withhold or cause to be withheld from the contractor under this contract, or any other Federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other federally-assisted contract subject to Davis-Bacon prevailing wage requirements, which is held by the same prime contractor, so much of the accrued payments or advances as may be considered necessary to pay laborers and mechanics, including apprentices, trainees, and helpers, employed by the contractor or any subcontractor the full amount of wages required by the contract. In the event of failure to pay any laborer or mechanic, including any apprentice, trainee, or helper, employed or working on the site of the work, all or part of the wages required by the contract, the contracting agency may, after written notice to the contractor, take such action as may be necessary to cause the suspension of any further payment, advance, or guarantee of funds until such violations have ceased.

## **3. Payrolls and basic records**

a. Payrolls and basic records relating thereto shall be maintained by the contractor during the course of the work and preserved for a period of three years thereafter for all laborers and mechanics working at the site of the work. Such records shall contain the name, address, and social security number of each such worker, his or her correct classification, hourly rates of wages paid (including rates of contributions or costs anticipated for bona fide fringe benefits or cash equivalents thereof of the types described in section 1(b)(2)(B) of the Davis-Bacon Act), daily and weekly number of hours worked, deductions made and actual wages paid. Whenever the Secretary of Labor has found under 29 CFR 5.5(a)(1)(iv) that the wages of any laborer or mechanic include the amount of any costs reasonably anticipated in providing benefits under a plan or program described in section 1(b)(2)(B) of the Davis-Bacon Act, the contractor shall maintain records which show that the commitment to provide such benefits is enforceable, that the plan or program is financially responsible, and that the plan or program has been communicated in writing to the laborers or mechanics affected, and records which show the costs anticipated or the actual cost incurred in providing such benefits. Contractors employing apprentices or trainees under approved programs shall maintain written evidence of the registration of apprenticeship programs and certification of trainee programs, the registration of the apprentices and trainees, and the ratios and wage rates prescribed in the applicable programs.

b. (1) The contractor shall submit weekly for each week in which any contract work is performed a copy of all payrolls to the contracting agency. The payrolls submitted shall set out accurately and completely all of the information required to be maintained under 29 CFR 5.5(a)(3)(i), except that full social security numbers and home addresses shall not be included on weekly transmittals. Instead the payrolls shall only need to include an individually identifying number for each employee ( e.g. , the last four digits of the employee's social security number). The required weekly payroll information may be submitted in any form desired. Optional Form WH-347 is available for this purpose from the Wage and Hour Division Web site at <http://www.dol.gov/esa/whd/forms/wh347instr.htm> or its successor site. The prime contractor is responsible for the submission of copies of payrolls by all subcontractors. Contractors and subcontractors shall maintain the full social security number and current address of each covered worker, and shall provide them upon request to the contracting agency for transmission to the State DOT, the FHWA or the Wage and Hour Division of the Department of Labor for purposes of an investigation or audit of compliance with prevailing wage requirements. It is not a violation of this section for a prime contractor to require a subcontractor to provide addresses and social security numbers to the prime contractor for its own records, without weekly submission to the contracting agency..

(2) Each payroll submitted shall be accompanied by a "Statement of Compliance," signed by the contractor or subcontractor or his or her agent who pays or supervises the payment of the persons employed under the contract and shall certify the following:

(i) That the payroll for the payroll period contains the information required to be provided under §5.5 (a)(3)(ii) of Regulations, 29 CFR part 5, the appropriate information is being maintained under §5.5 (a)(3)(i) of Regulations, 29 CFR part 5, and that such information is correct and complete;

(ii) That each laborer or mechanic (including each helper, apprentice, and trainee) employed on the contract during the payroll period has been paid the full weekly wages earned, without rebate, either directly or indirectly, and that no deductions have been made either directly or indirectly from the full wages earned, other than permissible deductions as set forth in Regulations, 29 CFR part 3;

(iii) That each laborer or mechanic has been paid not less than the applicable wage rates and fringe benefits or cash equivalents for the classification of work performed, as specified in the applicable wage determination incorporated into the contract.

(3) The weekly submission of a properly executed certification set forth on the reverse side of Optional Form WH-347 shall satisfy the requirement for submission of the "Statement of Compliance" required by paragraph 3.b.(2) of this section.

(4) The falsification of any of the above certifications may subject the contractor or subcontractor to civil or criminal prosecution under section 1001 of title 18 and section 231 of title 31 of the United States Code.

c. The contractor or subcontractor shall make the records required under paragraph 3.a. of this section available for inspection, copying, or transcription by authorized representatives of the contracting agency, the State DOT, the FHWA, or the Department of Labor, and shall permit such representatives to interview employees during working hours on the job. If the contractor or subcontractor fails to submit the required records or to make them available, the FHWA may,

after written notice to the contractor, the contracting agency or the State DOT, take such action as may be necessary to cause the suspension of any further payment, advance, or guarantee of funds. Furthermore, failure to submit the required records upon request or to make such records available may be grounds for debarment action pursuant to 29 CFR 5.12.

#### **4. Apprentices and trainees**

##### **a. Apprentices (programs of the USDOL).**

Apprentices will be permitted to work at less than the predetermined rate for the work they performed when they are employed pursuant to and individually registered in a bona fide apprenticeship program registered with the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration, Office of Apprenticeship Training, Employer and Labor Services, or with a State Apprenticeship Agency recognized by the Office, or if a person is employed in his or her first 90 days of probationary employment as an apprentice in such an apprenticeship program, who is not individually registered in the program, but who has been certified by the Office of Apprenticeship Training, Employer and Labor Services or a State Apprenticeship Agency (where appropriate) to be eligible for probationary employment as an apprentice.

The allowable ratio of apprentices to journeymen on the job site in any craft classification shall not be greater than the ratio permitted to the contractor as to the entire work force under the registered program. Any worker listed on a payroll at an apprentice wage rate, who is not registered or otherwise employed as stated above, shall be paid not less than the applicable wage rate on the wage determination for the classification of work actually performed. In addition, any apprentice performing work on the job site in excess of the ratio permitted under the registered program shall be paid not less than the applicable wage rate on the wage determination for the work actually performed. Where a contractor is performing construction on a project in a locality other than that in which its program is registered, the ratios and wage rates (expressed in percentages of the journeyman's hourly rate) specified in the contractor's or subcontractor's registered program shall be observed.

Every apprentice must be paid at not less than the rate specified in the registered program for the apprentice's level of progress, expressed as a percentage of the journeymen hourly rate specified in the applicable wage determination. Apprentices shall be paid fringe benefits in accordance with the provisions of the apprenticeship program. If the apprenticeship program does not specify fringe benefits, apprentices must be paid the full amount of fringe benefits listed on the wage determination for the applicable classification. If the Administrator determines that a different practice prevails for the applicable apprentice classification, fringes shall be paid in accordance with that determination.

In the event the Office of Apprenticeship Training, Employer and Labor Services, or a State Apprenticeship Agency recognized by the Office, withdraws approval of an apprenticeship program, the contractor will no longer be permitted to utilize apprentices at less than the applicable predetermined rate for the work performed until an acceptable program is approved.

##### **b. Trainees (programs of the USDOL).**

Except as provided in 29 CFR 5.16, trainees will not be permitted to work at less than the predetermined rate for the work performed unless they are employed pursuant to and

individually registered in a program which has received prior approval, evidenced by formal certification by the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration.

The ratio of trainees to journeymen on the job site shall not be greater than permitted under the plan approved by the Employment and Training Administration.

Every trainee must be paid at not less than the rate specified in the approved program for the trainee's level of progress, expressed as a percentage of the journeyman hourly rate specified in the applicable wage determination. Trainees shall be paid fringe benefits in accordance with the provisions of the trainee program. If the trainee program does not mention fringe benefits, trainees shall be paid the full amount of fringe benefits listed on the wage determination unless the Administrator of the Wage and Hour Division determines that there is an apprenticeship program associated with the corresponding journeyman wage rate on the wage determination which provides for less than full fringe benefits for apprentices. Any employee listed on the payroll at a trainee rate who is not registered and participating in a training plan approved by the Employment and Training Administration shall be paid not less than the applicable wage rate on the wage determination for the classification of work actually performed. In addition, any trainee performing work on the job site in excess of the ratio permitted under the registered program shall be paid not less than the applicable wage rate on the wage determination for the work actually performed.

In the event the Employment and Training Administration withdraws approval of a training program, the contractor will no longer be permitted to utilize trainees at less than the applicable predetermined rate for the work performed until an acceptable program is approved.

c. Equal employment opportunity. The utilization of apprentices, trainees and journeymen under this part shall be in conformity with the equal employment opportunity requirements of Executive Order 11246, as amended, and 29 CFR part 30.

d. Apprentices and Trainees (programs of the U.S. DOT).

Apprentices and trainees working under apprenticeship and skill training programs which have been certified by the Secretary of Transportation as promoting EEO in connection with Federal-aid highway construction programs are not subject to the requirements of paragraph 4 of this Section IV. The straight time hourly wage rates for apprentices and trainees under such programs will be established by the particular programs. The ratio of apprentices and trainees to journeymen shall not be greater than permitted by the terms of the particular program.

**5. Compliance with Copeland Act requirements.** The contractor shall comply with the requirements of 29 CFR part 3, which are incorporated by reference in this contract.

**6. Subcontracts.** The contractor or subcontractor shall insert Form FHWA-1273 in any subcontracts and also require the subcontractors to include Form FHWA-1273 in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for the compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with all the contract clauses in 29 CFR 5.5.

**7. Contract termination: debarment.** A breach of the contract clauses in 29 CFR 5.5 may be grounds for termination of the contract, and for debarment as a contractor and a subcontractor as provided in 29 CFR 5.12.

**8. Compliance with Davis-Bacon and Related Act requirements.** All rulings and interpretations of the Davis-Bacon and Related Acts contained in 29 CFR parts 1, 3, and 5 are herein incorporated by reference in this contract.

**9. Disputes concerning labor standards.** Disputes arising out of the labor standards provisions of this contract shall not be subject to the general disputes clause of this contract. Such disputes shall be resolved in accordance with the procedures of the Department of Labor set forth in 29 CFR parts 5, 6, and 7. Disputes within the meaning of this clause include disputes between the contractor (or any of its subcontractors) and the contracting agency, the U.S. Department of Labor, or the employees or their representatives.

**10. Certification of eligibility.**

a. By entering into this contract, the contractor certifies that neither it (nor he or she) nor any person or firm who has an interest in the contractor's firm is a person or firm ineligible to be awarded Government contracts by virtue of section 3(a) of the Davis-Bacon Act or 29 CFR 5.12(a)(1).

b. No part of this contract shall be subcontracted to any person or firm ineligible for award of a Government contract by virtue of section 3(a) of the Davis-Bacon Act or 29 CFR 5.12(a)(1).

c. The penalty for making false statements is prescribed in the U.S. Criminal Code, 18 U.S.C. 1001.

**V. CONTRACT WORK HOURS AND SAFETY STANDARDS ACT**

The following clauses apply to any Federal-aid construction contract in an amount in excess of \$100,000 and subject to the overtime provisions of the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act. These clauses shall be inserted in addition to the clauses required by 29 CFR 5.5(a) or 29 CFR 4.6. As used in this paragraph, the terms laborers and mechanics include watchmen and guards.

**1. Overtime requirements.** No contractor or subcontractor contracting for any part of the contract work which may require or involve the employment of laborers or mechanics shall require or permit any such laborer or mechanic in any workweek in which he or she is employed on such work to work in excess of forty hours in such workweek unless such laborer or mechanic receives compensation at a rate not less than one and one-half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of forty hours in such workweek.

**2. Violation; liability for unpaid wages; liquidated damages.** In the event of any violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (1.) of this section, the contractor and any subcontractor responsible therefor shall be liable for the unpaid wages. In addition, such contractor and subcontractor shall be liable to the United States (in the case of work done under contract for the District of Columbia or a territory, to such District or to such territory), for liquidated damages. Such liquidated damages shall be computed with respect to each individual laborer or mechanic, including watchmen and guards, employed in violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (1.) of this section, in the sum of \$10 for each calendar day on which such individual

was required or permitted to work in excess of the standard workweek of forty hours without payment of the overtime wages required by the clause set forth in paragraph (1.) of this section.

**3. Withholding for unpaid wages and liquidated damages.** The FHWA or the contracting agency shall upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor withhold or cause to be withheld, from any moneys payable on account of work performed by the contractor or subcontractor under any such contract or any other Federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other federally-assisted contract subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, which is held by the same prime contractor, such sums as may be determined to be necessary to satisfy any liabilities of such contractor or subcontractor for unpaid wages and liquidated damages as provided in the clause set forth in paragraph (2.) of this section.

**4. Subcontracts.** The contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clauses set forth in paragraph (1.) through (4.) of this section and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with the clauses set forth in paragraphs (1.) through (4.) of this section.

## **VI. SUBLETTING OR ASSIGNING THE CONTRACT**

This provision is applicable to all Federal-aid construction contracts on the National Highway System.

1. The contractor shall perform with its own organization contract work amounting to not less than 30 percent (or a greater percentage if specified elsewhere in the contract) of the total original contract price, excluding any specialty items designated by the contracting agency. Specialty items may be performed by subcontract and the amount of any such specialty items performed may be deducted from the total original contract price before computing the amount of work required to be performed by the contractor's own organization (23 CFR 635.116).

a. The term "perform work with its own organization" refers to workers employed or leased by the prime contractor, and equipment owned or rented by the prime contractor, with or without operators. Such term does not include employees or equipment of a subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor, agents of the prime contractor, or any other assignees. The term may include payments for the costs of hiring leased employees from an employee leasing firm meeting all relevant Federal and State regulatory requirements. Leased employees may only be included in this term if the prime contractor meets all of the following conditions:

(1) the prime contractor maintains control over the supervision of the day-to-day activities of the leased employees;

(2) the prime contractor remains responsible for the quality of the work of the leased employees;

(3) the prime contractor retains all power to accept or exclude individual employees from work on the project; and

(4) the prime contractor remains ultimately responsible for the payment of predetermined minimum wages, the submission of payrolls, statements of compliance and all other Federal regulatory requirements.

b. "Specialty Items" shall be construed to be limited to work that requires highly specialized knowledge, abilities, or equipment not ordinarily available in the type of contracting organizations qualified and expected to bid or propose on the contract as a whole and in general are to be limited to minor components of the overall contract.

2. The contract amount upon which the requirements set forth in paragraph (1) of Section VI is computed includes the cost of material and manufactured products which are to be purchased or produced by the contractor under the contract provisions.

3. The contractor shall furnish (a) a competent superintendent or supervisor who is employed by the firm, has full authority to direct performance of the work in accordance with the contract requirements, and is in charge of all construction operations (regardless of who performs the work) and (b) such other of its own organizational resources (supervision, management, and engineering services) as the contracting officer determines is necessary to assure the performance of the contract.

4. No portion of the contract shall be sublet, assigned or otherwise disposed of except with the written consent of the contracting officer, or authorized representative, and such consent when given shall not be construed to relieve the contractor of any responsibility for the fulfillment of the contract. Written consent will be given only after the contracting agency has assured that each subcontract is evidenced in writing and that it contains all pertinent provisions and requirements of the prime contract.

5. The 30% self-performance requirement of paragraph (1) is not applicable to design-build contracts; however, contracting agencies may establish their own self-performance requirements.

## **VII. SAFETY: ACCIDENT PREVENTION**

This provision is applicable to all Federal-aid construction contracts and to all related subcontracts.

1. In the performance of this contract the contractor shall comply with all applicable Federal, State, and local laws governing safety, health, and sanitation (23 CFR 635). The contractor shall provide all safeguards, safety devices and protective equipment and take any other needed actions as it determines, or as the contracting officer may determine, to be reasonably necessary to protect the life and health of employees on the job and the safety of the public and to protect property in connection with the performance of the work covered by the contract.

2. It is a condition of this contract, and shall be made a condition of each subcontract, which the contractor enters into pursuant to this contract, that the contractor and any subcontractor shall not permit any employee, in performance of the contract, to work in surroundings or under conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous or dangerous to his/her health or safety, as determined under construction safety and health standards (29 CFR 1926) promulgated by the Secretary of Labor, in accordance with Section 107 of the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (40 U.S.C. 3704).



3. Pursuant to 29 CFR 1926.3, it is a condition of this contract that the Secretary of Labor or authorized representative thereof, shall have right of entry to any site of contract performance to inspect or investigate the matter of compliance with the construction safety and health standards and to carry out the duties of the Secretary under Section 107 of the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (40 U.S.C.3704).

### **VIII. FALSE STATEMENTS CONCERNING HIGHWAY PROJECTS**

This provision is applicable to all Federal-aid construction contracts and to all related subcontracts.

In order to assure high quality and durable construction in conformity with approved plans and specifications and a high degree of reliability on statements and representations made by engineers, contractors, suppliers, and workers on Federal-aid highway projects, it is essential that all persons concerned with the project perform their functions as carefully, thoroughly, and honestly as possible. Willful falsification, distortion, or misrepresentation with respect to any facts related to the project is a violation of Federal law. To prevent any misunderstanding regarding the seriousness of these and similar acts, Form FHWA-1022 shall be posted on each Federal-aid highway project (23 CFR 635) in one or more places where it is readily available to all persons concerned with the project:

18 U.S.C. 1020 reads as follows:

"Whoever, being an officer, agent, or employee of the United States, or of any State or Territory, or whoever, whether a person, association, firm, or corporation, knowingly makes any false statement, false representation, or false report as to the character, quality, quantity, or cost of the material used or to be used, or the quantity or quality of the work performed or to be performed, or the cost thereof in connection with the submission of plans, maps, specifications, contracts, or costs of construction on any highway or related project submitted for approval to the Secretary of Transportation; or

Whoever knowingly makes any false statement, false representation, false report or false claim with respect to the character, quality, quantity, or cost of any work performed or to be performed, or materials furnished or to be furnished, in connection with the construction of any highway or related project approved by the Secretary of Transportation; or

Whoever knowingly makes any false statement or false representation as to material fact in any statement, certificate, or report submitted pursuant to provisions of the Federal-aid Roads Act approved July 1, 1916, (39 Stat. 355), as amended and supplemented;

Shall be fined under this title or imprisoned not more than 5 years or both."

### **IX. IMPLEMENTATION OF CLEAN AIR ACT AND FEDERAL WATER POLLUTION CONTROL ACT**

This provision is applicable to all Federal-aid construction contracts and to all related subcontracts.

By submission of this bid/proposal or the execution of this contract, or subcontract, as appropriate, the bidder, proposer, Federal-aid construction contractor, or subcontractor, as appropriate, will be deemed to have stipulated as follows:

1. That any person who is or will be utilized in the performance of this contract is not prohibited from receiving an award due to a violation of Section 508 of the Clean Water Act or Section 306 of the Clean Air Act.
2. That the contractor agrees to include or cause to be included the requirements of paragraph (1) of this Section X in every subcontract, and further agrees to take such action as the contracting agency may direct as a means of enforcing such requirements.

## **X. CERTIFICATION REGARDING DEBARMENT, SUSPENSION, INELIGIBILITY AND VOLUNTARY EXCLUSION**

Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by 31 U.S.C. 1352. Any person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each such failure.

3. The prospective participant also agrees by submitting its bid or proposal that the participant shall require that the language of this certification be included in all lower tier subcontracts, which exceed \$100,000 and that all such recipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

## **ATTACHMENT A - EMPLOYMENT AND MATERIALS PREFERENCE FOR APPALACHIAN DEVELOPMENT HIGHWAY SYSTEM OR APPALACHIAN LOCAL ACCESS ROAD CONTRACTS**

For the obligation of the contractor to offer employment to present or former employees as the result of a lawful collective bargaining contract, provided that the number of nonresident persons employed under this subparagraph (1c) shall not exceed 20 percent of the total number of employees employed by the contractor on the contract work, except as provided in subparagraph (4) below.

2. The contractor shall place a job order with the State Employment Service indicating (a) the classifications of the laborers, mechanics and other employees required to perform the contract work, (b) the number of employees required in each classification, (c) the date on which the participant estimates such employees will be required, and (d) any other pertinent information required by the State Employment Service to complete the job order form. The job order may be placed with the State Employment Service in writing or by telephone. If during the course of the contract work, the information submitted by the contractor in the original job order is substantially modified, the participant shall promptly notify the State Employment Service.

3. The contractor shall give full consideration to all qualified job applicants referred to him by the State Employment Service. The contractor is not required to grant employment to any job applicants who, in his opinion, are not qualified to perform the classification of work required.

4. If, within one week following the placing of a job order by the contractor with the State Employment Service, the State Employment Service is unable to refer any qualified job applicants to the contractor, or less than the number requested, the State Employment Service will forward a certificate to the contractor indicating the unavailability of applicants. Such certificate shall be made a part of the contractor's permanent project records. Upon receipt of this certificate, the contractor may employ persons who do not normally reside in the labor area to fill positions covered by the certificate, notwithstanding the provisions of subparagraph (1c) above.

5. The provisions of 23 CFR 633.207(e) allow the contracting agency to provide a contractual preference for the use of mineral resource materials native to the Appalachian region.

6. The contractor shall include the provisions of Sections 1 through 4 of this Attachment A in every subcontract for work which is, or reasonably may be, done as on-site work.
